

MEXICAN MAIN BATTLE NEARER

Douglas, Ariz., Officers Suspected of Selling Arms to Rebels

NOGALES, Sonora, March 28. (UP)—Rebels commandeered all trucks and jitneys here tonight to transport soldiers to the west of Nogales when it was reported that loyal federal troops were advancing from the state of Lower California.

Among the trucks seized was one owned by a Nogales, Ariz., furniture house, bearing an Arizona license.

A federal column of 800 cavalrymen was reported to have occupied Sasabe, Sonora, an important cattle shipping point, just across the line from San Fernando, Ariz., and 79 miles west of here.

Three hundred of the 800 mounted federal troops were reported at Bonnadou ranch, 50 miles west of Nogales.

MEXICO CITY, March 28. (UP)—The fall of Jimenez, latest rebel stronghold in the state of Chihuahua, was expected to occur without opposition after the capture of Escobedo by federal troops today. Plutarco Elias Calles, Mexican minister of war, commanding federal troops in the field, reported the capture of Escobedo in a message to the government at noon today. He said he believed the rebels would not resist when federal troops reached Jimenez, 45 miles northwest.

Escobedo, in the state of Chihuahua near the border of Durango, was captured by cavalry under Gen. Benigno M. Serrano after a short engagement. It was reported 200 rebels formed the garrison there. Later accounts of the fight at Escobedo said four rebels were killed and two federal wounded.

JAUREZ, Mex., March 28. (UP)—Mexican rebel headquarters late today, denying federal reports that General J. G. Escobedo, rebel commander, was retreating from Jimenez, said a clash between federal and rebels in that vicinity might come at any moment.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., March 28. (UP)—With the entire city administration squaring under the suspicious eye of the United States department of justice, investigation of an alleged gun-running conspiracy involving city officials was pursued with renewed vigor today.

Mayor Millard Haymore announced that Police Chief Leslie Galtiff and Police Captain Walter Morris, who are at liberty on \$5,000 bond each, will resume their duties.

Eight additional arrests have been made, and department of justice agents promise more within a short time.

Investigation of the alleged conspiracy was precipitated when two machine guns and 17,000 rounds of ammunition, belonging to the city of Douglas disappeared.

Government agents charged the munitions were sold to Mexican rebels at Agua Prieta, Sonora. The purchase price was \$2,000, only \$500 of which was

NOGALES, Sonora, March 28. (UP)—A bulletin issued here tonight by revolutionary leaders, claimed that a federal unit at Mazatlan, Sinaloa, had been surprised by an attack by a rebel force.

The announcement said that the federalists apparently had been defeated completely, abandoned by insurrectionist troops, but that the latter appeared and drove them back to their fortifications. A number of participants were believed killed in the skirmish, it was said.

The bulletin said that General Ramon Huerta was in charge of rebels remaining outside Mazatlan and that General Francisco Manzo and General Roberto Cruz were leading a main body of the rebel army on an asserted southward drive. Manzo's present position was given as at La Cruz, north of Mazatlan, for the purpose of directing troop movements.

HOUSE BUYS BLY HOTEL

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peace. Otherwise, his regime was "short." There is little that rises above the average other than the anti-war treaty, unless it be his liberal Chinese policy, and there were one or two incidents which critics called "bungling." His handling of the Nicaraguan and Mexican situations lies in this category.

Hoover to Supervise

In general, the transfer of administration is expected to bring a more positive tone to handling of foreign affairs, with President Hoover himself playing a far more important role in supervising foreign relations than did President Coolidge.

Kellogg, who succeeded Charles Evans Hughes four years and twenty-four days ago, came out with his one outstanding achievement, not finally consummated. Two powers, France and Japan, still have not ratified the anti-war treaty, but it is on the calendar in France. Kellogg was advised today, and Japan is expected to ratify soon. The 12 other signatory nations have ratified, and when these two follow suit, the treaty becomes operative.

The retiring secretary was gratified that 20 other non-signatory nations ratified the treaty. Suggested by Brian

While the anti-war treaty was suggested in the first place by Foreign Minister Briand of France, as a treaty only between the two countries, Kellogg's achievement lies in extending it to include all the world powers.

Kellogg's administration has been signalized in treaties of all sorts. He has signed his name to 81. One of his first acts as secretary of state was to begin to extend and amplify the old Root arbitration treaties.

Fraught for Chinese Policy

When Kellogg became secretary, he was confronted with problems in Nicaragua, Mexico, China and the ancient Taen-Arica dispute between Peru and Chile. A settlement of the last-named is expected soon.

Today finds problems still in the other three countries, but of a different nature. Kellogg has been praised highly for his Chinese policy. He flatly refused to join with Great Britain in a "strong-arm" policy and the United States was the second power to recognize the new nationalist regime, following Russia.

Stimson Faces Questions

The retiring secretary's Mexican and Nicaraguan policies did not bring such praise. Dispatch of marines to Nicaragua and Kellogg's public statement that Mexico was "on trial before the world," during the oil controversy with the southern republic, were severely criticized in the senate by democrats and western independent republicans.

Nicaragua is quiet for the moment, but Mexico is in the midst of another revolution and civil war again appears imminent in China. There are problems for the calm-tempered new secretary, as well as numerous others that Kellogg leaves as a heritage, including the P.M. Alone incident, Latin-American policy, war debts and reparations, and naval armaments.

Pitcher John Picus Quinn of Athletics Dean of Big Leagues

NEW YORK, March 28. (UP)—With Ty Cobb in retirement and Tris Speaker no longer in the major leagues, John Picus Quinn, veteran southpaw of the Philadelphia Athletics, is the dean of big league ball players.

Beginning his 20th season in the majors, Quinn is the oldest player in point of service in either league. Quinn is also one of the oldest active players remaining in baseball. He will reach the age of 45 on July 5.

Quinn, who was a star with the New York Yankees as far back as 1916, when he won 18 games and lost 10, is one of the five spitball pitchers remaining in the majors. The others are Red Faber, Berleish Grimes, Clarence Mitchell and Bill Oak.

Quinn spent his boyhood days as a breaker boy in the Pennsylvania coal mine and those long, strenuous days underground developed a physique which has been able to stand the rigors of 26 years of minor and major league pitching.

Miller to Build Three-Story Store
