Another bout that will attract a lot of attention is between Frankie Monroe, who recently cleaned Pete Maraganes, Filipino battler, and Mexican Joe Valencia, Alamo. Mexican Joe stole the card at Chilquien Wednesday evening when he met Harold Wright, Indians' pride.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 29. (UP)—Victories of Portland and Los Angeles in the Pacific coast league today placed those teams in a tie with Sacramento for leadership of the circuit, but the feature of the day was a one-hit game hurled by George Boehler of Oakland.

The single hit was made by Sherlock, Mission first baseman, in the sixth inning. The Oaks pounded out 12 hits to make the final score 6 to 1. One Mission runner crossed home plate in the seventh inning on an error by Vergez, Oakland third baseman.

Portland beat San Francisco's Solons, 6 to 2, assuming leadership in the first inning and never relinquishing it. Mahaffey pitched for the Beavers and allowed the Solons only five scattered hits. Portland has won three games of the series.

Kearns' Protest Is Overruled

CHICAGO, March 29. (UP)—Jack Kearns this afternoon was unsuccessful in an attempt to protest the result of the Mickey Walker-Tommy Loughran fight heavyweight championship fight here last night.

Kearns, manager of Walker, objected to the 2-1 decision which allowed Loughran to retain his title. The two judges voted for Loughran, and Davey Miller, the referee, cast his vote for Walker.

Kearns particularly objected to the scoring of Judge Klein, who gave Loughran eight rounds and called two even. Phil Collins, the other judge, scored six rounds for Loughran, two for Walker and two even. Miller gave Loughran only one round, Walker four, and termed five even.

The Illinois athletic commission called a special meeting to consider the protest and overruled it.

University Track Records Smashed

AUSTIN, Tex., March 29. (UP)—Claude Bracey, of Rice institute, flashed ahead of a fast field of entrants in the 100-yard dash event today to equal the world's record and to set a new intercollegiate record in the fifth annual Texas relays. His time was 9.5.

In the four-mile relay, university class, Illinois set a new intercollegiate and relay record of 17:49.1.

Pavlo Narmi in a special two-mile feature, stepped the distance in 9:29.8. His record is 9:17.

NATIONAL RACE MAY BE CLOSE

Eight Clubs Fall in Two Separate Divisions With Ease

NEW YORK, March 29. (UP)—Training camp evidence forecasts another wide-open, bitterly-waged race in the National league this season.

The domination of the American league by the New York Yankees during the past three seasons has left the senior circuit to furnish baseball fans with most of the September thrills in major league circles, and this season promises to be no exception.

In Two Groups Naturally enough, the eight clubs of the National league fall into two groups as evenly as if they had been hand-picked and sorted exactly that way.

In the first group fall the Chicago Cubs, New York Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals.

In the second group come the Cincinnati Reds, Brooklyn Robins, Philadelphia Phillies and Boston Braves.

Cubs, Giants Best By no stretch of the imagination can the Robins, Phillies or Braves be classed as possible first division teams. The Cincinnati Reds with a good, if somewhat aging, pitching staff, might make first division, but it will take the unexpected collapse of one of the teams named in the first group to bring about such a state of affairs.

On paper, the Cubs and Giants appear the most formidable contenders. But both the Pirates and Cardinals have the ingredients for a championship club.

Phillies Infield Fine The Phillies have a championship infield with Hurst at first, Thompson at second, Thoenow at short and Whitting at third, and may get out of the cellar.

Little hope is held out for the Brooklyn Robins unless Wright's arm gets well and Dazzy Vance has another successful season. Right now Brooklyn looks like a contender for the cellar.

The Boston Braves hardly resemble anything better than a seventh place club, but Hank Gowdy, Johnny Evers and Flabbi Maraville may convert them into a fighting ball club, which would be something, considering the conduct of the Braves in recent years.

Boston Bruins Win Hockey Title

NEW YORK, March 28. (UP)—The Boston Bruins won the 1929 professional hockey championship of the world tonight when they defeated the New York Rangers 2 to 1, in one of the greatest games of the season.

Outplaying the Rangers in every way, the Bruins looked the part of champions, although the blue-clad New Yorkers forced them at every stage of the game.
