HAWAII TEAM WILL TRAVEL

Islanders to Play Oregon in Portland Next November

EUGENE, Ore., March 30. (UP)—University of Oregon football team will meet University of Hawaii at Multnomah Stadium in Portland November 23, according to an announcement made here today by Jack W. Bonfield, graduate manager of University of Oregon.

The game will be a return meeting between the teams. Oregon traveled to Honolulu last winter and played games with the University of Hawaii and the Honolulu town team. The Oregon team several years ago also made a trip to Hawaii, but this will be the first appearance of the Hawaiians in the northwest.

Runs 100 in 9 2-5 With Aid of Wind

OWHBY STADIUM, Dallas, Tex., March 30. (UP)—Running with a stiff breeze, Claude Bracey, Rice Institute and Olympic flash, ran the 100-yard dash of the Southern Methodist Relays here today in the world record-breaking time of 9 2-5 seconds.

But because he had the wind advantage, no official record recognition of his performance was expected.

The world's record for the event is 9.5 seconds, which Bracey equaled in the Texas Relays yesterday.

A new southwest broad jumping record was set by Portman of Northwestern University with a leap of 24 feet 7 1/2 inches, comparing with the world's record of 25 feet 2 inches held by Hamm, Georgia Tech.

Girl Athletes Set New Records

BOSTON, March 30. (UP)—Two new world's records were established at the Boston Garden tonight as 160 women and girl athletes, representing New England and six outside states, competed in the biggest national indoor championship meet for women ever held in this country.

An Olympic star, Jean Shiley, of Meadowbrook A. C., Philadelphia, set a new world mark for women in the running high jump when she cleared the bar at five feet 3 1/2 inches.

The other world record which fell was in the shot put, Rena Macdonald, of the Boston Swimming association, tossing for 39 feet 3 1/2 inches. The previous record, held by herself, was 37 feet, 11 inches.

Swim Records Set In Every Event

ST. LOUIS, March 30. (UP)—For the first time in the history of American collegiate swimming, records were shattered here tonight in every final competitive event against time in the sixth annual National Collegiate A. A. U. tank meet.

Two world and six collegiate records were broken.

The world marks established were in the 150-yard back stroke event, set by George Kojac, Rutgers, who clipped six-tenths of a second from his previous mark of 1:39, and by the Northwestern Modley relay team, Hinch, Peterson and Schwartz, which shaved six-tenths of a second from its previous mark of 3:10.

National Casaba Tourney to Start

CHICAGO, March 30. (UP)—The best of the country's high school basketball teams will begin to arrive here tomorrow, preparatory to competing in the University of Chicago's annual national interscholastic tournament.

More than 40 teams will vie for the right to become national champion and 1929 records of the various outlays indicate that more high grade teams are entered than in any previous year.

NEW YORK, March 30. (UP)—The sad decline into which the business of fistfights has fallen, despite the introduction of several new promotion groups, never has been more strikingly evident than at the present moment.

In the entire United States there is not one champion of the world in any division capable of adequately defending his title.

Yanking up the various classifications of the cauliflower industry one by one, we find the heavyweight title without even a logical claimant since the retirement of Gene Tunney.

Longman Getting Heavy
As for the 175-pound class, Tommy Longman has admitted he cannot long hope to fight successfully if he must take off weight.

Who's Welter Champ?
The welterweight division has fallen into disrepute, with Joe Dundee both unable and unwilling to defend his championship against a first-rate contender.

The National Boxing association has taken away the Baltimore welterweight's title, and has handed it on to Jackie Fields, but the decision of the N.B.A. does not carry much weight in New York, to say the least.

Mandel on Run
Sammy Mandel, lightweight champion, once more is on the run. Having successfully de-

fended his title against Jimmy McLarnin, after the utmost persuasion, Sammy was stopped by Jimmy Goodrich, and has hinged off from fighting for several months more.

The featherweight situation is somewhat clearer, but the titleholder, Andre Roufus, has been away from these shores for some time. He returned this week.

No Bantam Champ
There is no bantamweight champion, despite the rather ludicrous claims of Bushy Graham of Udon, who goes about fighting 120-pounders who will come in overweight, but who is not recognized in New York as the real bantamweight king.

Which brings us to the flyweights, a division in which none of the contenders stands out.

Schwartz Recognized
Corporal Izzy Schwartz is tacitly recognized in New York state and "Spider" Plandner of France has been given recognition by the N.B.A. There is some doubt, however, as to whether these two boys really are the best of the fly fellows.

Frederick Belanger, Frankie Genaro, Newbury Brown and a number of others are quite capable of holding their own with the title claimants.

Not since boxing came under some sort of general regulation in this country has the situation regarding championships been in such a mess.

Kidnaped College Girl Sobs for Aid In Telephone Call

MONTREAL, March 30. (AP)—A wrong telephone connection and a sobbing girl's appeal "come and get me, mother," today constituted the vague and only clue unearthed after a week of frantic search for 18-year-old Barbara Pitcher, McGill university student and daughter of a prominent Westmount family.

Police said that about nine o'clock the night of March 22, when Miss Pitcher disappeared, the telephone call in the house of H. W. K. Hale, Westmount, Mrs. Hale answered and heard a sobbing voice, evidently that of a young girl, saying "Come and get me, mother." Mrs. Hale's daughter was at the time a patient in the Montreal General hospital and thinking it was she Mrs. Hale asked excitedly, "Where are you?"

Hysterical
"I don't know where I am but come and get me, oh come and get me," came hysterically over the phone and the connection was lost.

Mr. Hale was told by the hospital that it could not possibly have been his daughter who telephoned. The next morning, when it became known that Barbara Pitcher was missing, he communicated with her family. The information was withheld by the police until yesterday.

The Pitcher telephone number is Westmount 2131 and that of the Hale residence Westmount 4128. Police believe that the slight similarity of numbers might have resulted in a wrong connection.

FEDERALS SAY REBELS FLEE

Border Patrol Increased; Mexican Flier Killed; Main Attack Soon

MEXICO CITY, March 30. (UP)—Federal cavalry under Gen. Anacleto Lopez, defeated rebels commanded by Gen. J. Escobar and Gen. Urzaga at Corales, Chihuahua, late today, according to a message received at the presidential headquarters here tonight from Gen. Plutarco Calles, chief commander of the government forces.

The report was relayed via Gen. Almazan and said that many insurgents had been killed, but that the number was not obtainable because the field of battle had not yet been cleared.

Calles' report added that the enemy engaged in the battle consisted of five regiments—probably about 1,500 to 2,000 men—according to the announcement by government officials here.

Details of the battle were lacking, Calles' message concluded with the information that the Almazan had ordered a detachment of federal troops under Gen. Lopez to pursue the retreating rebels.

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, March 30. (UP)—Hard pressed by advancing forces of Gen. Plutarco Calles, the rebel army of Gen. J. Gonzalez Escobar is again beginning to retire in southern Chihuahua.

Forced to withdraw from advanced positions at Hermosillo and Acapulco two days ago by week, Amador Zetella, financial manager of Calles' troops, said today, under General Almazan and Gen. J. G. Escobar, said today.

NOGALES, Sonora, Mexico, March 30. (UP)—Fragmentary advice received at rebel headquarters here tonight from Gen. Topete said fighting between federal and rebel forces on that town began with the exchange of rifle fire at long range early today.

According to the Topete dispatch, the exchange of fire was mainly for the purpose of finding out the strength of the federal defenses and locating any weak spots. The dispatch also indicated that storming of the garrison may begin during the night or at dawn tomorrow.

TEHUACAN, Mexico, March 30. (UP)—Rebel authorities announced late today that a federal aviator, believed to be Gen. Co. Humberto Fierro, head of the Mexican government's air service, was killed at Minaca today when his plane was shot down.

The flyers' body was crushed so badly, immediate identification was impossible.

EL PASO, Tex., March 30. (UP)—Additional United States troops will arrive Sunday for Columbus, N. M., to strengthen the border patrol there, it was announced at Fort Bliss today.

The second platoon of Troop E, 8th Cavalry, has been ordered to join the first platoon of the same regiment, already there.

HOUSTON, Tex., March 30. (UP)—Mexican rebel forces expected to fight the decisive battle of the revolution less than a week, Amador Zetella, financial manager of Calles' troops, said today, under General Almazan and Gen. J. G. Escobar, said today.
