

## CLUBS TO FACE REAL BIG TEST

First Week Sees Portland  
in Tie for First With  
Sacs, Angels

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1. (UP)—The first real test of the comparative strength of teams in the Pacific Coast League will be afforded by series that will start in four California cities Tuesday.

All squads of the circuit rested today from the strenuous first week, from which Portland, Los Angeles and Sacramento gained major honors.

On the basis of play in the first week, Los Angeles should be in first place at the end of the week. The Angels will meet Hollywood in Los Angeles. Only twice in seven starts were the Stars able to vanquish Sacramento to last week, while the Angels took five out of seven games from Seattle by large scores.

Interest will probably center on the contests at Sacramento this week between Portland and the Senators. They are believed to be evenly matched and a single victory may determine the final outcome. Both teams won five out of seven games last week to tie Los Angeles for first place.

The San Francisco Seals will play against the San Francisco Mission here and Seattle will oppose Oakland in the east bay city.

Damon Savage, Chiloquin boxer, promoter, has announced that he will stage a card on April 10, featuring Gene O'Grady and Nails Gorman in the main event.

Gorman is training hard for the bout. O'Grady is keeping in shape. In his last match in Chiloquin Gorman went on against Orville Darr to save the show, when Darr's opponent failed to arrive for the match. He had trained but two days in nearly a month, but he gave Orville Darr a hard fight before he was given the decision.

Dick Reed, "Klamath" rooter, will return to the ring after more than a year's layoff and will meet K. O. Peterson, Eugene, in the semi-wind-up of the card. The remainder of the card has not yet been announced.

(TIJUANA, Mex., April 1. (UP)—Loughran, light heavyweight champion, has been offered \$100,000 to defend his title against Mickey Walker in a 45-round bout here. —News Item.)

NEW YORK, April 1. (UP)—It's not how long the boys are in the ring but what they do while they're in there that counts.

Twice as Much Disgust—Fight fans whose fancies are stirred by a Tijuana promoter's proposal for a 45-round bout for the light heavyweight championship shouldn't overlook the fact that it's quality and not quantity that counts in fistfights.

Those who complain against the dull 10-round bouts of the present era would have twice as much about which to complain if the length of most of these modern fights were doubled.

As Many Punks 20's—The agitation for legislation permitting longer fights in many states doesn't take into account the fact that there were just as many poor 20-round bouts in "the good old days" as there are punk 10-rounders today.

Who was the greatest and most spectacular fighter of our days? Jack Dempsey.

The records show that Dempsey fought only three fights over 10 rounds in the length of his entire career.

Ten Rounds Plenty—When Jack fought, ten rounds were plenty, some of them usually superfluous.

The three fights which the champion allowed to go more than 10 rounds included an obscure 20-round draw with an unknown Andy Mallon back in

1926, a 12-round knockout over Bill Brennan in 1926, and that 15-round affair with Tom Gibbons in Shelby in 1923.

Enough From Gene—Jack won the heavyweight championship in three rounds of fighting at Toledo, knocked out Billy Miske in three rounds, let Georges Carpentier stay four rounds to please Tex Rickard, and tackled his Luis Angel Firpo to the canvas in two beats.

Dempsey also stopped Jack Sharkey in seven rounds, fair or foul.

"Ten rounds was plenty for each of my two fights with Tunney," Jack admitted. "I guess I was licked enough by that time to admit I'd met a better man."

## Walker - Loughran To Go 45 Rounds

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 1. (UP)—Jack Kearns, manager of Mickey Walker, stopped long enough in Albuquerque today to announce that preliminary arrangements have been concluded for a finish fight between Walker and Tommy Loughran for the light heavyweight championship of the world.

Kearns, aboard the Chief, on the Santa Fe railroad, bound for California, said Loughran would receive \$100,000 for his share. He said the fight would be held May 29 at Agua Calientes, Mexico, and the official agreement would call for 45 rounds of boxing.

## Four-Day Tank Contest Starts

NEW YORK, April 1. (UP)—Individual effort is expected to overshadow team endeavor when the leading athletes of the nation meet Tuesday for the start of the annual four-day athletic union championships.

Last year when the meet was held in Chicago the spotlight was held by the Illinois A. C. team, which, headed by the almost invincible Johnny Weissmuller, dominated a majority of the events and walked away with team honors.

This year the I. A. C. combination is shattered. Weissmuller has become a professional.

Team strength appears rather evenly divided this year with the Lake Shore A. C. of Chicago, the New York A. C. and the Brooklyn Central Y. M. C. A. among the leaders.

## Maloney Sued for \$10,000; Another Man's Row Cause

BOSTON, April 1. (UP)—Jimmy Maloney, Boston heavyweight title contender, has been named in a \$10,000 damage suit, it became known here today when the case went to trial in superior court.

Maloney is charged by Charles A. McCarthy of Dorchester, a truck driver, with striking and knocking him down on January 10, 1927. Maloney has denied the charges and declared that McCarthy was mistaken over the identity of his assailant.

According to the story by McCarthy on the stand today, he had stopped before an express office to deliver packages and found a passenger car parked in front of the office.

McCarthy asked the driver to move out. In backing out the car scraped his assistant's knee. An altercation followed and the driver of the passenger car, whom McCarthy alleged to have been Maloney, struck McCarthy, injuring him seriously enough to necessitate hospital treatment.

Under Joseph P. Walsh, attorney for the defendant, McCarthy admitted he had identified a picture of a man named Frank J. Meaney in "Rogues" gallery as his assailant before securing a warrant against Maloney.
