The grudge fight is said to have originated in Dorris, the present "home town" of Bunker, when Ritchie is said to have "knocked" an Indian boy. Bunker took the boy's side and only bystanders kept the two heavyweights from staging a free show in the street.

Dorris Fans to Attend  
Bickstaff immediately signed Ritchie. Bunker went out for a while and then waited to fight Ritchie what would equal four rounds in time, but didn't care about having any intermissions—just a good old rough set-to.

Practically every man in Dorris and a large number of women plan on seeing the finish of the fight started in their town. Bickstaff stated last night when he returned from the California arena.

Daily Confident  
All the fighters worked out in the Memorial hall last night for the last time and will only take light limbering up exercises today. A large number of fans gathered the fast, young, and ambitious bunch take a final course in the fight art.

Mike Daly, "our own boy" from Pelican City, dropped in from his training quarters at the Pelican gym and watched Warnecke go through his paces. "I can take that Dutchman in five rounds," Mike said.

Warnecke Just As Sure  
But Warnecke was to bet his life on the purse that he would have Daly.

Church showed speed and a terrific punch for his weight. Breedlove took his usual systematic workout and showed consistency in performance.

Billy Meets Moore  
Billy Breedlove and Frankie Moore will meet in the semi-finals. This was made necessary when the card was cut down to allow the grudge fight. Pat Bickstaff has a cold and will not go on. Mexican Joe Valencia was also cut from the card.

## GRIDMEN OUT AT OREGON HORNSBY MAY AID OR HINDER

Spring Football Practice Sees 45 Men in Suits: Coach Optimistic

Sluggers' Record Shows Bad Temper; Starts Season Well

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 4. (UP)—Spring football practice at the University of Oregon was resumed this week with a turnout of some 45 men. Although several backfield candidates remain, Captain John J. McNamee, coach, will concentrate mostly on the linemen, where he expects to be in difficulty next fall, because of lack of capable substitutes.

Although several prospective centers were on deck, George Stadelman and Eric Forda seem to have the inside track for the two regular posts. Stadelman is a two-year letterman, while Forda was a graduate from the freshman ranks.

WATSON TO RETURN  
Marshall Stadelman is the only veteran guard available. Jerry Little, sub last year, and C. West, who comes up from the 1928 "warbling squad," are outstanding candidates for the guard post left vacant by Merrill Hagan, who has played his three years on the varsity.

George Christensen and Austin Culbert, the huge sophomore tackles, were among those present, as were also Levin Schula and Pat Lewis, promising sophomores. Marlon Hall and Scott Warren, lettermen, were not out. Hall is a trackman, while Warren is not in school.

Woody Archer, letterman, and Gene Tarbell and John Fricker, sophomores, are the only three wingmen showing class. With the expected return of Harry Wood next fall, McNamee hopes to have a capable quartet.

There are about two dozen candidates out for the backfield posts. When the final elimination is completed in October, only eight or ten will remain on the first squad. Those who so far have shown the most promise include: Johnny Kinschler, Dave Mason, Chuck Williams, John Deane and Bobby Robinson, lettermen. Al Brown, Johnny Landahl and Steve Fletcher, sophomore freshmen, and Chuck Shear, who played last year with the Ashland Normal school.

Spring practice will continue for two weeks, with scrimmages scheduled for the last ten days.

## Morgan Retains Title by Decision Over Indian Boy

LOS ANGELES, April 4. (UP)—Ted Morgan defended his world junior lightweight title successfully here tonight when he defeated back Swarthmore North of Panama, by a unanimous 10-round decision.

The little dark boy who came on of the jumbos in a contest but five years ago took only one round by a decisive margin and Morgan took four. The other five were even.

Three times in the late stages of the battle, Zorilla was warned for hitting low. Once the bout was halted while Morgan regained his breath after a low blow.

Morgan weighed 125 pounds and Morgan 126 pounds. The referee was Jack Kennedy.

Referee Earl S. Rio of San Bernardino made short work of Jimmy Fox, Los Angeles, in the scheduled 10-round semi-final, when he scored a technical knockout in the second round. Referee Henry Whitman stopped the fight as Fox was rolling on the floor for the third time in two rounds.
