of the four-day meeting here of the governors of the 12 reserve banks, before whom, it is presumed, the statement was laid. The board met today with the governors.

It was also highly significant that before the release of the bulletin, Secretary of the Treasury Mellon said he expected no new move by the federal reserve board as a result of its meeting with the governors. This was interpreted as indicating the difference over policy between Mellon and the board which is rumored.

Reviews Policy Coupled with its warning, the board in its bulletin reviewed its general aims and defended its policy over a long period, which was interpreted as an answer to criticism from many quarters and preparatory to any investigation which congress may make.

The board commended the federal reserve banks for their co-operation, and secured from governors here, it is understood, assurances of further co-operation. It reports progress in readjustment of the credit situation recently as indicated by a decline in brokers' loans of member banks.

Just before the final decline in the remand rate, profit-taking was in progress. That was soon stemmed and a sharp rally took place in such issues as General Motors, U. S. Steel, General Electric, Radio and a long list of other high grade issues.

the gold room of the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home, Pine avenue at Sixth, where friends may call. Announcement of funeral arrangements will be made later.

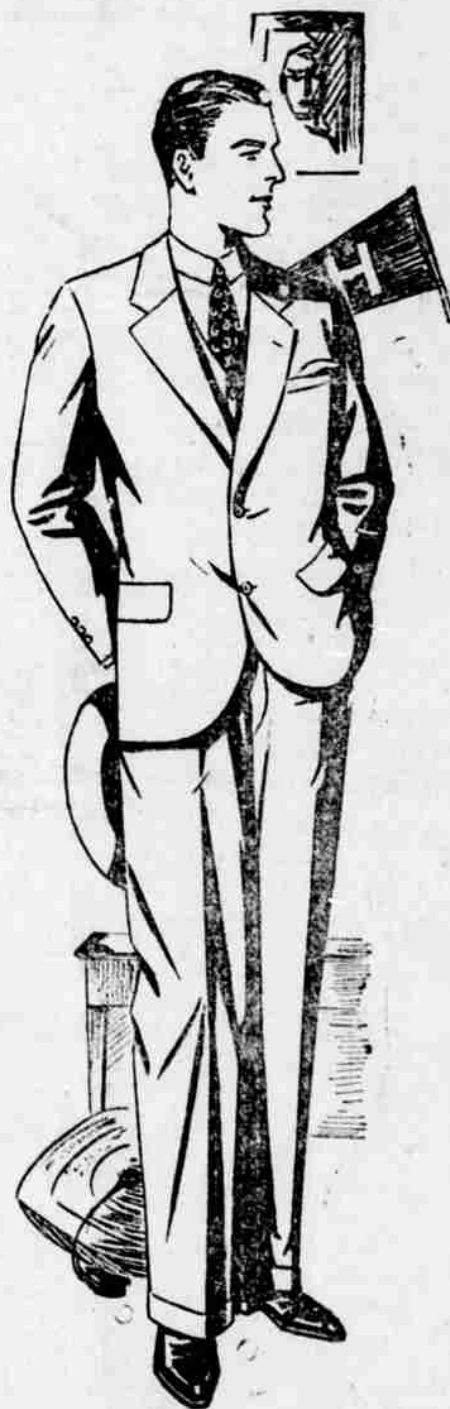
