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Mrs. M. Lotches Upholds Captain

Harold Wright and Bennett Weeks, two Indian youths.
"The trouble all started when Wright and Weeks wanted Teddy Captain's car and he wouldn't let them have it," Mrs. Lotches told the jury. "Wright attempted to get Teddy to drink, and finally he became mad and started using vile language toward Teddy's mother and sister."
According to the witness, Wright was ordered to leave the house several times, but refused to do so. Finally Teddy grabbed a gun which had been under a pillow, and aimed at Wright in the doorway just as Lotches entered. The gun went off, Lotches fell forward, and Wright had already disappeared, she said.
All the Indians, frightened, fled to the outside except Teddy Captain, according to the witness' story, where they remained until they heard Captain sobbing: "Morris Lotches—did I kill him? I loved Morris as my own father."

Autopsy Performed
It was about two hours after this that Bennett Weeks was sent to summon officers who, when they arrived, found Lotches lying dead in a large pool of his own blood, and his body covered with a light cloth, according to other witnesses on the stand.
Other witnesses to take the stand at the inquest were Dr. Patterson of Klamath Agency, who performed an autopsy on Lotches' body and found that death was caused from a hemorrhage and shock caused from a wound penetrating the neck; Edna Captain, who was an eye witness to the shooting and George McNabb, special deputy sheriff, who was called after the death of Lotches.

Findings of Jury
At the close of the inquest the jury found that Morris Lotches came to his death by means of a gunshot wound and that Teddy Captain is guilty of a crime thereby. Appended to the jury's verdict was the further statement: "We believe that this death should be further investigated by the department of justice, U. S. A., and that what further action deemed necessary should be taken by the federal court, U. S. A."

No charges had been filed against the defendant at a late hour last night, according to Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner.
Investigator Here
A special investigator of the United States department of justice, and Superintendent L. D. Arnold, of the Klamath reservation, yesterday questioned Ted Captain for a long time.
Details of the nature of the information obtained could not be learned. It is expected that a federal charge will be filed either today or early Monday morning before Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner.

Americans Killed, Wounded by Rebels

complete victory for the federal garrison.
The rebels began the assault with tanks, airplanes, infantry and cavalry.
Rebels Mowed Down
They were met and stopped by a deadly fire from the entrenched federals. Each succeeding attack was similarly stopped.
At times the rebel tanks approached to within a few yards of the trenches, only to be driven off by federal machine gun fire.
The assault continued for four hours, with rebel casualties heavy. One entire line of rebel infantry was mowed down by one federal machine gunner.
The federals took their dead and wounded with them as they withdrew. The federals claimed more than 50 rebels were killed and many more wounded.
The federals said they suffered "practically no losses."
Americans Send Protest
During the fighting 300 men arrived to reinforce the garrison at Naco. The men were those interned at Fort Bliss since they fled from Juarez when that city fell to the rebels.
Once during the battle an American squad under Lieut. R. W. Curtis discovered Mexican rebels attempting to flank federal trenches by approaching from the American side of the border. The rebels were driven back across the line.
Another company of the 25th United States Infantry arrived today, placing the total number of American soldiers here at 400.
Prominent business men of the American city sent a telegram to Senators Hayden and Ashurst and Congressman L. W. Do-clar, all of Arizona and now in Washington, protesting against the violation of neutrality laws.
