FIRE ON LINER KILLS 1, BURNS 6 NEW YORK, April 11. (UP)—The United States liner President Roosevelt was swept by a spectacular fire today as it lay at its pier in Hoboken, and for two hours was in danger of destruction.

One member of the crew was killed and six other men were burned severely as they fought to escape the flames deep in the hold of the big vessel. Four of them were in a critical condition tonight.

The fire began in the bilges of the ship and spread quickly to the oil room, where it exploded the liner's large containers of fuel. There it trapped six of the crew, who were working in an adjoining storeroom.

Nicholas Burke, fireman, descended into the blazing hold and carried out three of the men. On his last trip, burned badly about the face and body, he collapsed and fell against a stanchion, suff-

ANGELS HOLD LEAGUE LEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, April 11. (UP)—For the first time since the Pacific Coast league started two and a half weeks ago, one team, the Los Angeles Angels, held a substantial lead of the circuit tonight.

The contest at Los Angeles was the most exciting of the day. Oakland had tied the score, three to three, in the eighth inning and made another run in the first of the ninth. Then the Angels made three runs in the last half to gain the important victory.

Eight runs in the fifth and sixth innings were alone sufficient for the Seals' win over Sacramento. The Senators had been in first place at the start of the week.

Girl Attorney Convicts 16 Men

CHICAGO, April 11. (UP)—Sixteen former members of the Chicago Association of Candy Jobbers were found guilty of violating the Sherman anti-trust act in a verdict opened in federal court today. Nineteen other defendants were acquitted.

Those found guilty of operating the so-called "candy racket" are liable to sentences of a year in prison and fines ranging as high as \$5,000.

The convictions were secured by Miss Mary Connor, blue-eyed New England girl, who served as the government's anti-trust expert and battled alone against the combined efforts of four defense lawyers.

The government charged that the candy jobbers used stench bombs and window smashing to intimidate candy and cigar stores which refused to join the "racket."
