Miss Helen Norris of Medford, who has endeared herself and become widely known through her radio plays within the last several months, is given added publicity in an article which appears in the Christian Science Monitor of April 1. The article is an interview with Mrs. Willa Wilson Church, known nationally as a pioneer woman radio dramatist and for years director of dramatic productions at the General Electric station, KGO, Oakland, Cal., and of the National Players at the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting company.

In speaking of Miss Norris, who is described as "the youthful author of Medford, Ore.," Mrs. Church says, "Miss Norris wrote to ask me what kind of plays could be presented over the air." She continues, "I described to her the possibilities of radio drama. She began to write. More than 12 of her plays have been

given at the KGO studio and they are now being broadcast from stations in Schenectady, Denver and Portland. Miss Norris uses the homely realities of simple lives as themes for her plays."

Mr. McCornack was not "money-minded"; what wealth he had acquired during his lifetime was simply a means to an end and that end was always to lend timely help to his neighbors.

Series of incidents are being told of him Mr. McCornack, strictly loaned money to poverty stricken farmers. Some times the money was returned, but often very often, it was not, and Mr. McCornack took the loss with a smile and let it go at that.

Mr. McCornack was famous for his trait of helping out the so-called "under-dog". One of his admirers yesterday commented:

"If Frank had been half as selfless over his own welfare as he was over his friends, he would have amassed a fortune during his many years residence in Klamath Falls. But, at that, I believe his life was happier, for he derived real and lasting enjoyment over the good deeds he has done during his life."

Mr. McCornack's death comes as a shock to thousands of his friends. Not until he was rushed to the hospital Wednesday was his condition realized. Several days ago he was seen in his rough farming clothes chatting, as usual, with friends.

Mr. McCornack is a direct descendant of the famous McCornack clan of Scotland. The ancestral McCornack farm named Anaballish was located three miles from Kirkcubbin and seven miles from Newton Stewart in Wiltshire, Scotland. It dates back to 1269.

Frank McCornack was one of 12 children. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McCornack, who crossed the plains in 1852, taking six months to reach Olympia, Wash. They moved to Eugene, Ore., where Mr. McCornack was born, January 21, 1865.

In 1889, Mr. McCornack moved to Klamath county and on December 21, 1890 married Rose Wolf.

Besides his widow, Mr. McCornack leaves two sons, Eugene F. McCornack of Dilley, Ore., Frank H. McCornack Jr., of Klamath Falls; two daughters, Mrs. C. F. O'Laughlin, Klamath Falls and Mrs. R. P. Oliver, Klamath Falls; two grandchildren, Clyde Austin McCornack and Marjorie Ann McCornack; the brother, J. K. McCornack, Pullman, Wash., five sisters, Mrs. Janet M. Collier, Mrs. Helen Stevenson, Mrs. Leatha Wells, Miss Mary McCornack, all of Eugene, and Mrs. Agnes Geary of Portland. Five nephews reside in Klamath county. They include Everett Geary, E. A. Geary, George Stevenson, Andrew Collier and Alfred C. J. Her.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home, Pine avenue at Sixth. The Rev. D. V. Haight, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will preside. The body will be interred in Lindeville cemetery.
