

Captain Hearing On Murder Charge Is Set For Today

Preliminary hearing of Teddy captain, held on a second degree murder charge in connection with the death of Morris Latches, fellow tribesman one week ago today on the Captain ranch, will open today before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas, in the Loomis building.

There was some doubt concerning the question of whether the hearing would be held in Klamath Falls, or the case taken directly before the federal grand jury. The United States district attorney was inclined to think the best procedure would be to forego the preliminary.

However, M. O. Wilkins, attorney for Captain, insisted on a preliminary and his request was granted by the federal magistrate. The hearing was originally set for April 25.

Captain's defense will be tinged on the premise that the firing of the gun was entirely accidental.

O. C. & E. Starts Daily Service
