

MANZO QUILTS REBEL CAUSE, FLEES TO U. S.

Federals Surprise Bandits Capture Many, Kill Few; Plan Attacks

NOGALES, Ariz., April 12. (U. P.)—General Francisco Manzo, whose forces made the first revolutionary move in Sonora at the outbreak of the present uprising, deserted the rebel army tonight and entered the United States.

He started for Los Angeles, but was returned to the home here which has been occupied by his family for several weeks. His representatives said he was seriously ill with a high fever.

Glad I'm Through

His physician refused to allow anyone to see him, but Manzo sent word that he was definitely through with the revolt, supplementing his earlier statement that he was "Glad I'm through with it."

The Sinaloa army he deserted was reported trapped in the northern part of that state. General Plutarco Elias Calles, who has taken control of Sinaloa, is reported to have cut off retreat to the north by putting troops ashore from two gunboats at Empalme, just outside the entrance to Guaymas bay.

Possible Attacks

If the reports are borne out, troops from Empalme will set the rebels on the north federalists under General Carr-

deas will drive the rebels on from the south.

The rebel strength in Sonora, their chief remaining stronghold, is centered at Oromina, south of Naco, which they attacked unsuccessfully on two occasions. General Fausto Topete and J. G. Escobar, who alone outranked Manzo, command at Oromina.

Report Rebels Flee

Federal fliers who bombed Oromina with unknown result reported that the rebels were bringing up additional troops from Guaymas.

It was reported from another source that rebels began a hasty movement of troops from Oromina tonight, departing on trains without waiting for train orders from the railroad company.

NACO, Sonora, Mex., April 12. (U. P.)—Twenty-two rebel soldiers were killed and 38 were taken prisoner today when a small body of federal troops swept down upon a camp of sleeping insurgents.

The federalists consisted of 100 infantrymen led by General Augustin Olachen, and 80 cavalrymen headed by Colonel Flores. The rebels, 200 in number, were commanded by Captain Manuel Carrilla, whose main concern is being brought to Naco was to obtain food for his men. He said they had subsisted for weeks on coffee, corn and cigarettes.

Deserters from the main camp at Oromina, from which the group attacked today had been sent out, were said to have swelled the number of prisoners held in Naco to about 100.
