The craft dropped its motor and went into two tail spins. Andrews succeeding in righting it just before it fell into a tide flat.

HOMELESS SIT BY CAMP FIRES

Nearly 2,000 Persons in Tents in Tornado Stricken Area

NEWPORT, Ark., April 12. (UP)—Red Cross officials tonight had made the first reliable check of damage done by the tornado which swept six Arkansas counties Wednesday night. Alfred Evans, assistant National Red Cross disaster relief director, announced 51 bodies had been identified of the 57 known dead. There were 242 persons injured, 131 of them seriously, the Red Cross report stated, and 359 homes were demolished with between 1600 and 1700 persons made homeless. Estimate of property damage was withheld until reports had been tabulated from the wide area.

"When all isolated districts are checked it is probable the list of dead will be considerably increased," Evans said, "and it is probable that several of the injured will die."

Damage was done over an area 100 miles in diameter stretching across half a dozen counties. The towns of Swifton, Gulon, Parkin, Alicia and Batesville, however, were hardest hit. Three group funerals were held at Swifton and Gulon today.

Tent villages tonight provided shelter for survivors near the places where their former homes had been smashed into piles of broken timber and mortar. Stripped and uprooted trees contributed to the desolation which surrounds the tents. Debris was everywhere. Scattered boards were gathered together and lighted for the open fires, around which survivors tonight prepared their meals. Food, brought in by relief workers, was badly needed.

'Canned Heaters' Blamed for Fire

Fire believed by firemen to have been caused by "canned heaters" early yesterday morning badly damaged a house at No. 509 Spring street.

The fire department was called out at 2:15 a. m., but when they arrived the building was burning fast. Seven hundred feet of hose carried water to the structure and the fire was put out after about \$200 damage had been done. Art Dunn, assistant fire chief, stated last night.

COL. SINCLAIR ON MEX. BORDER

Father of Al Sinclair Sent With 20th Infantry to Protect U. S.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 12. (UP)—Elaborately equipped, the 20th infantry, U. S. Army, started today from Fort D. A. Russell for Bisbee, Ariz., to protect Americans in the war between Mexican rebels and federal troops in Mexico, along the United States border.

At 6 a. m. Sunday morning the third and final section will leave. The regiment, numbering 750 men and 25 officers under Col. W. S. Sinclair, probably will reach Bisbee late Sunday.

Col. W. S. Sinclair is the father of Al Sinclair, Klamath Union high school teacher and football coach. Up until a year ago Colonel Sinclair was stationed at the University of Oregon, where he was in charge of the R. O. T. C. and military instruction for a number of years.


