Barnes Tells of New Game Laws, Back From Meet

Fifty-one Oregon game war-
dens, including District Game
Warden Marion J. Barnes of
Klamath, have just completed an
intensive course of study of the
new and amended game laws
passed at the last session of the
state legislature.

Mr. and Mrs. Barnes returned
Thursday from Portland, where
the same warden has been at-
tending the state-wide meeting
of wardens.

"In brief," the warden said,
"these are the changes made in
the game laws:

"The deer season was short-
ened five days; it opens Sep-
tember 15 and closes October 29.
"Killing of a spike deer is un-
lawful. The deer limit is one
male and one black tail, or
two black tails. In other words,
only one male can be killed.

"Penalties for night hunting
have been increased to provide
a minimum fine of \$200 and a
maximum of \$1000.

"The bag limit on ducks in
Oregon has been reduced to 15
birds in any one day or 20 in a
week.

"The non-resident game license
has been increased from \$10 to
\$15. That will probably mean
that the California non-resident
license will be raised to equal
ours.

"The quail season was changed
to conform with the pheasant
season—in other words quail and
pheasant can be killed on every
Sunday and Wednesday during
the month of October.

"Jack Lloyd spurs, some-
times referred to as 'grass bands'
cannot be used in Klamath lakes
or streams. Only a single or tan-
den spoon can be used."

Modern Building Will Be Erected

physicians and dentists of the
city, who will move to their
new suites as soon as the big
structure is completed.

The third, fourth and fifth
stories will be rented to lawyers
and other business offices.

The business block will be
called the Oregon Bank building.
The Oregon Bank and Trust com-
pany, now located in temporary
quarters across the street, will
occupy the northeast corner
store-space of the new building,
with a frontage of 40 feet. Space
for four additional store rooms is
available on the ground floor—
one with a frontage of 26 feet on
Main; a second with a frontage
of 16 feet on Tenth; a third
with a frontage of 17 feet on
Tenth, and a fourth with a front-
age of 17 feet on Ninth.

"Construction will begin," said
Mr. Duke, "as soon as the prop-
erty is vacated by the city school
board. That will be early in
June. The building will be com-
pleted some time early in 1930,
probably in February.

The building will be con-
structed under class A specifica-
tions. It will be of concrete con-
struction and with concrete
floors. The exterior design will
be in accordance with the latest
thing in modern business build-
ing construction.

"The entrance to the building
will be just east of the Oregon
Bank and Trust company. There
will be two elevators, forced
ventilation and every office suite
in the building will be an out-
side suite.

"Each office suite will be con-
structed according to the desires
of the business or professional
men who take space in the new
building.

"Office space on the second,
third, fourth and fifth stories
will total 23,800 square feet."

During the past week, Mr.
Duke said, the Tri-State Realty
company has devoted practically
its entire time to the task of
securing renters for the building.
That their efforts have been met
with success is attested by the
fact that the second and third
stories of the big structure are
already rented.

Mr. Berry and Mr. Burns origi-
nally became interested in Klamath
Falls through their personal
and business association with
Mr. Duke. After a personal sur-
vey of the city and a careful
study of its future possibilities,
the two men became firmly con-
vinced that a major investment
was a sound business proposition.
Accordingly, they joined with
Mr. Duke in financing the con-
struction of the business block
and in the purchase of adjoining
property.

The three men have definite
plans for the development of the
remainder of the school block
which they acquired, but were
not ready to announce their in-
tentions at this time. An an-
nouncement in that connection
is anticipated in the near future.

perate efforts will be made to
retake the city.

By holding the city the fed-
erals have a support through
which to move arms and am-
munition and at the same time
have driven a wedge between the
rebel forces.

The federal group is directly

nora and those under General
Ramón Turbe, retreating from
the unsuccessful assault of Ma-
tanzas. By holding the city the
federals also control the railroad
down the west coast.

General Manzo and his staff

merly a back driver, said frank-
ly that he was relieved to be out
of the revolution.

He added that the whole move-
ment seemed to be a "useless
affair."

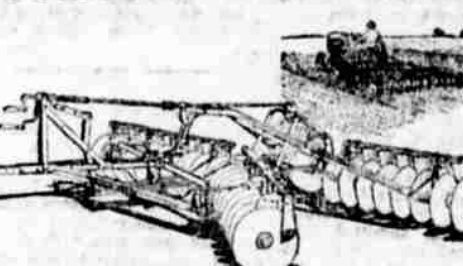
