

MAJOR LEAGUE BALL SEASON OPENS TODAY

Yanks and Giants or Cubs Favored to Win in League Races

NEW YORK, April 15.—Baseball is back again!

With 16 teams lined up for the opening gun, two major league pennant races will start Tuesday on a 151-game grind which will end October 6.

Interest will be centered in the opening at Washington, where President Hoover will add pomp and ceremony to the occasion.

President E. S. Barnard of the American League and other notables also will attend.

Yanks, Giants or Cubs
Well, street betting commensurators have made the New York Yankees favorites to win the American League pennant, and the New York Giants and Chicago Cubs equal choices in the National League race.

The Yankees are quoted 9 to 10 shots and Giants and Cubs joint favorites at 7 to 5 each.

The Yankees, Athletics, Browns and Senators have been picked as first division clubs in the American League by a majority of experts.

The Giants, Cubs, Cardinals and Pirates are figures as the first division clubs in the National League.

Tigers Mystery Club
The Cleveland Indians and Cincinnati Reds are rated as the two "dark horses," with either club likely to spring a surprise and edge its way into the first division. Neither, however, is regarded as an even outside pennant contender.

The mystery club of the majors is Rube Harris' Detroit Tigers. With a powerful, if somewhat uncertain lineup, the Tigers have a majority of the experts guessing as to their real strength.

The experts rank the Washington Senators, under the guiding hand of Walter Johnson, as the most improved ball club in either league. Several shrewd baseball men pick Washington as the team to win the American League pennant if the Yanks collapse.

Babe Is Question
With the Yankees it's a question of whether Babe Ruth is as good as ever, whether Herb Pennock can take his regular turn in the mound, whether the revised infield will stand up, and whether the team's all-around strength will offset a weak and crippled catching staff.

Injuries have hurt the Athletics, otherwise Connie Mack's team would loom as a more dangerous contender. With Al Simmons, Joe Mauer and George Barnhart out of the lineup, the A's will be handicapped for an indefinite period.

Food for Argument
The St. Louis Browns must be considered if they get the same sort of pitching from Sam Gray and General Crowder that they

did last season. The Cardinals, 1928 champions, are ranked below the Giants and Cubs in the National League race.

The Giants seem to have improved over last season, especially in the box, where they have Hubbell and Genewick, two stars who did not join the team last year until mid-season. The weakest link in the Giants apparently is at second base.

The Pirates may figure in the race if Traynor's injury does not keep him out of the game at intervals.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 15 (UP).—The fourth week of the Pacific Coast League will start Tuesday with interesting games scheduled for four cities of the coast.

Primary interest is probably the contests to be staged here between the San Francisco Seals and Oakland. The Seals, after an exceptionally poor start in the first two weeks, climbed to third place with seven straight victories over Sacramento.

Whether Sacramento weakened decidedly in the third week or San Francisco improved approximately 75 per cent will be determined in the series against Oakland.

Los Angeles, leading the league with a two-game advantage over the San Francisco Missions, will engage with the Senators, who dropped from first to sixth place last week.

The Missions and the fourth place Portland Beavers will attract major interest in the Pacific northwest, while Hollywood and Seattle, who meet at Seattle, seem to be as evenly matched as any two teams in the circuit.

HUDKINS WINS OVER EMANUEL

Ace Takes Nine of Ten Rounds, First Even; Lawyer Outboxed

WHITLEY FIELD, Los Angeles, April 15, (UP).—Armand Emanuel, the San Francisco Jewish boy, who laid aside his law books to become a heavyweight boxer, lost another chance to step forward in the ring game when he lost a ten-round decision to Ace Hudkins, a middleweight fighter as a light heavyweight in night.

The wildcat from Nebraska won by an overwhelming margin. At no time was Emanuel the aggressor. From the second round on—the first was even—Ace plunked forward and took the fight in hand.

Although Emanuel was trying to box with his opponent, he found himself driven to the ropes by devastating lefts and right uppercuts.

The fans had expected that Emanuel's boxing, fast for so big a man, would make it a close fight. But he failed to take a round, while Hudkins was taking nine.

In the first round they opened with lefts to the head. Even then Ace was slightly more aggressive and had Emanuel backing up. But Armand's cleverness held it even.

Ace touched the floor in the second round, but he was up immediately, and from the inside it seemed that Emanuel had pushed him down with two left hand shores. The wildcat was up so quickly that it seemed improbable that there was any force in the blows.

Even then Ace took the round, hard rights to the body giving him a margin.

In the third both started with lefts and rights to the body. Emanuel came out of the clinches spinning Hudkins away, but the Ace bored right in and made the San Francisco boy's boxing ineffective.

From then to the close Ace peppered Emanuel with lefts to the body, alternating with a damaging right. Ace looked good in the clinches.

Ace was forcing the fight, and by the fifth round the crowd knew that he was far ahead. His weaving style seemed to bother Emanuel.

In the eighth it seemed that he was coasting in, but in the ninth his corner ordered him to do so, and he refused. He kept boring in with devastating blows to the body and outboxed Armand.

Emanuel's eye was cut in the seventh round and when he went back for the eighth it had been pasted to prevent bleeding.

Emanuel had a decided weight advantage. He scaled 175 3/4 pounds, and Hudkins 166 1/8.

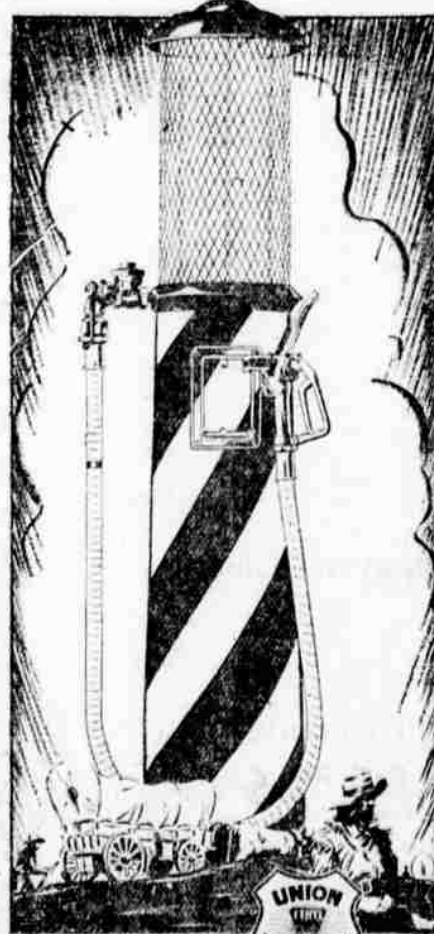
