Malin Woman Is Suicide Victim

Coroner Henry Joyaux, who investigated the affair, that Mrs. Krizo visited them Saturday and complained of a headache. It was known that she was worried because her husband's claim to a homestead on Tule lake was contested. The case had been tried in Klamath Falls before Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner, April 16 and 17, and the decision was pending in California courts. It was stated she had practically worried herself to death over this trouble.

Sends Husband Away

Mrs. Krizo had been living at the Malin ranch with the children, who are in school, but today she went over to the homestead, taking her daughter with her. Throughout the day she invented excuses to get her husband away from the cabin; once sending him to Malin for groceries, then back to the Oregon ranch to search for a checkbook which he was unable to find. Finally, about 5:30 this evening, she asked him to return to the other ranch and make another search for the checkbook. He left and took the little girl with him.

Resident 17 Years

Frank Toffel of Malin was cultivating some land for Mr. Krizo, and stated he saw him leave. He also said that earlier in the day Mrs. Krizo had talked with him and complained of illness. Toffel had completed his work for the day and left for home before the shooting. It is believed, Mrs. Krizo killed herself sometime between 6 and 6:30 p. m.

Mrs. Krizo was 45 years of age at the time of death. She was a native of Czechoslovakia, but had resided in the United States 22 years, and had made her home near Malin for the past 17 years. Besides her husband she is survived by four sons, Frank, Philip, John and Paul, one daughter Martha, and one brother, Tony Satz, all of Malin.

Tentative funeral arrangements have been set for Thursday at Malin. The body is in care of the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home in Klamath Falls.
