WEATHER CUTS BALL CROWDS

Alexander Pitches 365th Win; Babe Ruth to Marry Today

NEW YORK, April 16. (UP)—The 1929 baseball season opened disastrously today. All of the eastern games were rained out, while near freezing weather marred three of the four openings in the west.

The unseasonable weather reduced the aggregate attendance to less than 100,000. With half this number packed into Wrigley field to see the Pittsburgh Pirates beat the Chicago Cubs 4 to 3.

Alexander Wins

Twenty-five thousand shivering fans watched Grover Cleveland Alexander, oldest pitcher in the National league, begin his nineteenth major league campaign by pitching the St. Louis Cardinals to a 5 to 2 victory over the Reds at Cincinnati.

Only twenty-three thousand fans turned out for the two American league openings. A crowd of 17,000 braved the cold weather at Cleveland to witness the Indians' eleven-inning triumph over the Detroit Tigers, 5 to 4. A bare 7,000 attended the opening at St. Louis, where the Browns defeated the Chicago White Sox 3 to 1.

Weather permitting, the opening games postponed at New York, Washington, Boston and Philadelphia today will be played Wednesday.

Babe's Marriage Today

With the Yankees, Giants and Robins all idle today, the principal baseball news in the metropolitan district was Babe Ruth's approaching marriage to Mrs. Claire Hodgson, a former "follies" girl, Wednesday.

"I'm going to celebrate my wedding in a big way," Ruth said. "Watch me go tomorrow."

Down at Washington the rain and cold weather kept the Senators and Athletics idle and gave President Herbert Hoover another day to get his arm in shape to toss out the first ball.

The other two games postponed were at Philadelphia, where the Giants and Phillies were scheduled, and at Boston where the Braves and Robins were scheduled.

Despite the dismal weather, mid-season baseball provided in the four opening games.

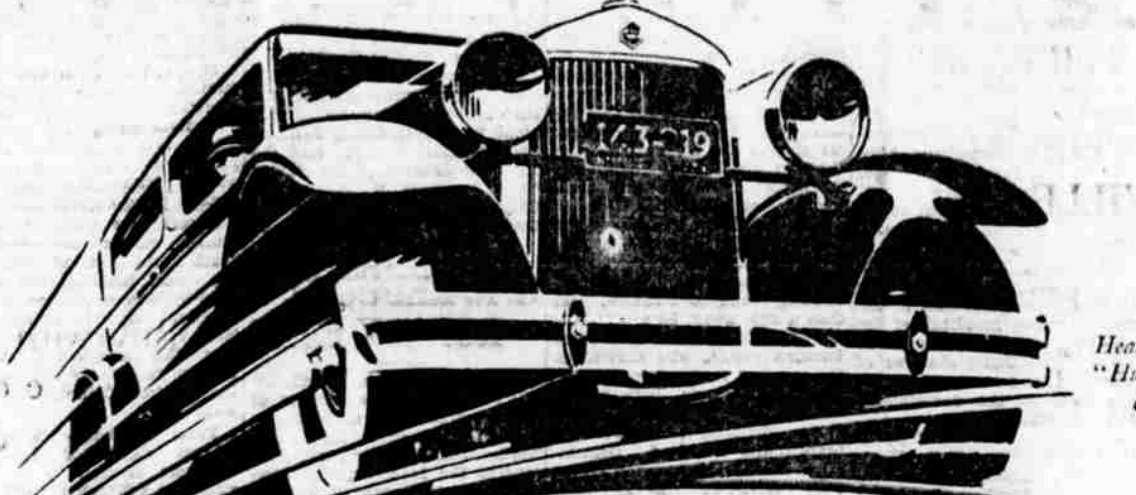
