

FIGHT CARD IS ANNOUNCED

Cleghorn, Cline Box Eight Rounds Before Large Gallery of Fans

Complete lineup for the boxing card Friday night was announced last night by Joe Barker, matchmaker. In the top spot is Johnny Cline, who arrived yesterday, and Walter Cleghorn, Bismillah Indian, who is out of a recent boxing defeat.

McKay vs. J. Breedlove. Jack McKay and Jack Breedlove, two 145-pounders, will meet in another six-round event, last night's "special." Both boys lost their fights on the last card, but both showed skill.

McKay lost to Al Stevens, a heavier man, while Breedlove lost to Billy Church, who was too fast for him.

Syd Anderson, Curlew, will meet Eddie O'Connor, Seattle, in a four-round bout. Both boys weigh 145.

Old Stewart of Klamath Falls will meet another Curlew man, Jimmy Garcia, in a four-round bout. The boys weigh 120 pounds.

Take Good Workouts. Cline and Cleghorn both worked eight rounds last night with their opponents and were in good shape. A large gallery of fans saw the workout and applauded loudly.

Cleghorn is down to his best fighting weight, 135, and Cline is in the condition. Cleghorn's manager, Roy David, arrived last night by motor from Seattle. He came from the Dallas to Klamath Falls yesterday. He had not seen his fighter when he stepped into the news office and hungry after the long drive.

Manager Confident. David is confident that with the heavy training that the Indians have been taking, and after working out last night with the air and getting down to his fighting weight, that Cleghorn will win over Cline.

Cline, a boxer of many years' experience, is not disheartened by his loss of a bout in San Francisco recently. He expects to meet another fight, and is ready to meet Cleghorn with anything that Cleghorn wishes to offer.

Both main events are "card" fights. Fans believe that they will see the best fight ever staged here. The fight is in a quarry, and is trying to figure out how to give everyone a good seat.

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TENNIS QUEEN IS OFF FOR EUROPE

Helen Talks of Nearly Everything But Game; Goes Shopping

NEW YORK, April 17. (UP)—Helen Wills, champion of the women's tennis world, paid New York a flying visit today, en route to Europe and new international racket conquests.

She sails at midnight on the S. S. Aquitania for England, first step on a trip that will bring her into active competition on English, French, Dutch and German courts in the next three months. The writers who dubbed her "Poker Face" doubtless never attempted to interview Miss Wills as she started on her last shopping tour before boarding a trans-Atlantic liner. They would have found her a most personable girl, thrilled at the prospect of her fifth invasion of European courts and seemingly interested in everything—except tennis.

The first topic was that of her presentation at the British court, which Miss Wills declined to discuss, pointing out that, inasmuch as formal announcement had not been made by the American embassy in London, comment on her part would constitute a breach of etiquette.

"How long do you intend to keep playing tennis?" she was asked. "Always, I guess. At least as long as my interest in the game continues. And I don't think it will ever flag. Mrs. May Bundy played at Wimbledon in 1905 and I understand she is returning again this year. The game has a great attraction."

She chatted at random, allowing little chances for questioning and saying little about tennis. She expressed a desire to know Jack Dempsey, declaring she believed him one of the most interesting persons in sport. She never follows boxing, however.

She commented on the shop windows, the weather, the crowds, her first book (published some time ago), and possible plans for a second. She denied any definite plans towards writing at present, but exhibited a large box which she carried, as the container of a number of drawings she has completed and with which she "hopes to do something."

Miss Wills will be accompanied on her voyage by Miss Gloria Collett, national women's golf champion, who is going to Europe to compete in the English and German women's championships.

Senators Tounce Angels, Seals Beat Oakland, Stars Win 5-2

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17. (UP)—The league-leading Los Angeles Angels were trounced by the Sacramento Senators for the second time in a row today, while the San Francisco Mission triumphed over the Beavers 5 to 2.
