

W. CLEGHORN, J. CLINE DRAW IN HARD BOUT

B. Breedlove Surprises Al Stevens With Kayo; All Bouts Good

In one of the most terrific fights ever fought in a Klamath ring, "Tiger" Johnny Cline held Walter Clegghorn to a draw last night at the Memorial hall in the ten-round main event of the Klamath fight card.

When the bout ended Clegghorn, the Eskimo Indian, with the "leaping left," was a sick Indian. His left eye was nearly shut after being poked and nearly closed in the sixth round, and his right eye was split open and bleeding badly in the last round.

Until the last round, the veteran Cline, who has a powerful and mysterious left, seemed to be a little bit the underdog, but he held up under the terrific onslaughts of the Indian and won back enough to get a fair draw at the close.

It was one of the hardest fought battles ever staged here, with the Indian at all times attacking, and Cline stopping blow after blow or rolling with them as they landed. The Eskimo seemed able to withstand Cline's mauling lefts until the last round when both his eyes were practically useless.

Whether the Indian has enough punch to win over Cline is as undecided as ever, but last night he landed out practically everything only to be repulsed with just as hard counter punches.

In the semi-windup, Billie Breedlove caught Sailor Al Stevens, a much older and more powerful man, off his guard as he came out at the start of the second round and floored the other with a hard sock to the jaw. Stevens never recovered from the effects of the blow and after being on the floor twice in this round the referee stopped the fight and awarded the decision to Breedlove, as the sailor was plainly in distress.

In the first round the sailor had the better of young Breedlove, who was a novice compared to his opponent, who was warned by the referee not to be too rough. Sailor Al followed the warning, but the surprise blow at the start of the second was unexpected. The fast Breedlove

landing before Sailor Al even saw it coming.

Jack Breedlove, fighting a smaller but faster and more ambitious man, Jack McCoy, in a six-round special, was lucky to get a draw. Jack Breedlove, who had the advantage in weight, failed at all times to show any aggressiveness, but preferred to keep covered up and let McCoy do all the fighting.

Syd Anderson, Eureka, showed well in his fight with Eddie O'Connor, Seattle, when Anderson kayoed the Irishman in the second round of the bout. At no time did O'Connor show any superiority over the fast and clever Eureka boy, who is billed as a semi-windup event in Eureka and coast cities.

In one of the many times he was downed in the two rounds which Rusty Stewart fought with Jimmy Moore, Rusty failed to get up quick enough and Moore was given a technical knockout in the second round of the four-round local-boy curtain raiser.

A packed house witnessed the fights, which were approved by fans as the best ever shown in the county.

BOSTON, April 19. (UP)—Johnny Miles, a sandy-haired youth from Hamilton, Ontario, set a new record for the historic 26-mile course, being 3 minutes, 59 seconds faster than that of Clarence De Mar, who established the previous record last year.

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Karl Koski and Willie Kyronen, both of the Finnish-American A. C. of New York, fought a thrilling battle for the lead in the closing moments of the race. Although they were unable to match the mankilling pace set by the flying leader, they did succeed in finishing in record-breaking time.

Koski finished second in 2:15:26, while Kyronen was a close third in 2:15:44.

NEW YORK, April 19. (UP)—The Philadelphia Athletics started in today when they left off last season's losing to the Yankees.

The Philadelphia outfield, minus Al Simmons, permitted two fly balls to drop safe and paved the way for the Yankees' 2 to 1 triumph before a crowd of 20,000.

The flux which halted the Athletics' pennant rush in the famous September series last season bore down on Connie Mack's club in the first game—a game they had every right to win—1 the season between the two leading contenders for the American league flag.

The Yanks won the pennant last year by taking 16 out of 24 games from the A's. It seems that the Yanks will win the pennant again this year if all it takes is to beat the A's.

It ever a ball club was needed for victory, the A's were today until the outfield sprung a leak in the seventh and eighth innings.
