MRS. JACKSON

GRANTS INTERVIEW

"The fundamental purpose in having high school girls take domestic science is to make them better home-makers." This was the statement made by Mrs. Paul T. Jackson, teacher of domestic science in Klamath Union high school, yesterday, when interviewed on the subject of domestic science in the high school.

"At present there are 44 girls taking sewing and 19 taking cooking. In the sewing classes, held every day for two periods, the girls sew on garments. This year they have made dresses, suits, waists and other smaller articles. They are taught fundamental processes in this course and instructed in the selection of material for garments and judging materials in ready-made clothing. The selection of color and style is also stressed so that they will be able to choose dresses suitable to their particular type."

"In the cooking class the study of foods, their selection, care in cooking, planning and serving of meals are stressed and table etiquette is taught. The lessons are prepared in meals, first taking breakfast then luncheon and last dinner. In this way the girls are able to prepare any of the meals."
