

CUBS SHUTOUT CARDS TWICE

Hornby's Bat Figures in Win; Reds Beat Pirates; Tigers Win

The Chicago Cubs made it two shutout victories in a row over the St. Louis Cardinals at Chicago, Monday, winning the second game of the series, 3 to 0. Percy Malone, the veteran pitcher, pitched a perfect game, holding the Cardinals to five hits while his mates were collecting ten.

Hornby scored what proved to be the winning run in the fourth inning, sending one of Alex's fast ones over the left field wall. The Cubs bunched hits in the fifth and sixth for the other runs.

Snow Prevents Games

Cincinnati came to life with a loud report in the seventh inning, after being held scoreless for six innings by Carmen Hill, Pittsburgh ace. Six runs in the seventh and three more in the eighth, enabled them to whip the Pirates, 9 to 4. Red Lucas led the Pirates to six hits.

AMERICAN LEAGUE

Only two games were played in the American league Monday, but both resulted in shutouts, the pitchers performing in mid-season style.

Detroit won a thrilling 1 to 0 victory over St. Louis at St. Louis, through the effective pitching of George Uhle. Uhle allowed only five hits in the nine innings and kept them well scattered. His opponent, Charlie Gaden, allowed only four hits in seven innings, but three of those, with the winning run, came in the first. Coffman, who finished the game, allowed one hit in two innings.

Alphonse Thomas and other Chicago White Sox blanked Cleveland, 10 to 0. Thomas allowed seven hits, well scattered, while his mates pounded four Indian batters for 15 hits and 10 runs. Four Cleveland errors aided the White Sox materially. Rain forced the cancellation of games between the Athletics and Yankees at New York, and the Red Sox and Senators at Washington.

Swan Jury Still Out at Press Time

(Continued from Page One)

struggle while the man lay on the ground, shot. "Gentlemen, that man had no gun when he was shot. It was placed there by the defendant when he stopped his car before leaving. The defense would have you believe that he stopped the car to get tools that were left in a garage."

Tools? Swan stopped that car, took the flashlight, this one here (picking up one introduced as evidence), surveyed the situation, made up his story and placed that gun which was found balanced on the body of Connolly. Just as it was found the day Sheriff Lloyd investigated.

"Cold-Blooded" Story
Gillenwaters admitted that the state had found no motive but he pointed to the evidence which he said showed that the defendant, Swan, shot with intent to kill, after premeditation and with malice.

E. E. Driscoll stated that he had not heard of such a cold-blooded crime "since the days when I read 'Diamond Dick,' and even those stories were not as cold blooded as the ones pictured by the district attorney, Mr. Gillenwaters." He further reviewed evidence presented by the defense which closed his case at 2:30 after Swan, his son, "Bobbie" and Swan's mother had testified, besides character witnesses for Swan and some who stated that Connolly had a bad reputation.

Driscoll took Gillenwaters to task for a statement made in his summing-up argument that the jury must stop the freeing of those accused of crimes and that some day a reckoning must be had for the outlaws in Klamath county. Horace Manning, chief of defense counsel, also strenuously objected to Gillenwaters' statements.

Manning Dramatic

Cont recessed at 5 p. m. and met at 7 o'clock, when Horace Manning took the floor of the courtroom and for two hours reviewed the case. He stated that it was Swan by the tree and that Connolly had been abusing Swan's son. Manning also stated that earlier in the evening after considerable drinking had taken place that Swan protected Mrs. Kirby Thomas from advances which he states testimony brought out.

He stated that Swan shot Connolly, that Connolly was armed and Swan heard threats made by Connolly against his life. Manning's final argument was marked with dramatic flashes and at times with fiery sentences aimed at Assistant District Attorney Gillenwaters, who he stated had misrepresented testimony.

Arguments End At 9:37

Judge Duncan ruled that the jury know the evidence and that they must not pay any attention to the arguments of the lawyers on points of quotation of testimony which either might not clearly remember.

Gillenwaters, closing for the state, stated that the jury must consider only the facts and forget the sentiment of the little boy. He stated that he too could play on emotion but the jury must not be guided by that. He stated that the defense had not shown how Swan could have been at the tree, and how Connolly's body could have fallen where it did unless he was by the tree. He praised Sheriff Lloyd for his work in investigating the scene following the homicide.

At 9:37 p. m. Gillenwaters ended and the state rested, as did the defense. Judge Duncan then gave his instructions and

Swan Testifies

Yesterday morning Swan took the stand in his own behalf and told a story of the "winning and dining" of the evening, of quarrels, of trying to avoid trouble and of sitting in the woodshed while others danced in the house. He stated that Connolly had a gun and walked past the tree where he was seated. He said "Is that you, Ned?" as Connolly turned with the gun in his hands. Swan said that he shot "I knew it was either my life or his," he stated.

Swan's son took the stand and substantiated his father's story, saying that Connolly took the gun and shells from him after Mrs. Thomas and the boy had taken the gun from Connolly and emptied the shells. Three cartridges were found in Connolly's pocket and his gun was empty when found by the sheriff.

Mrs. Swan, the defendant's mother, stated that Connolly had brought liquor to the cabin. She stated that she left the cabin about two weeks prior to the homicide.

Both sides put on character witnesses.

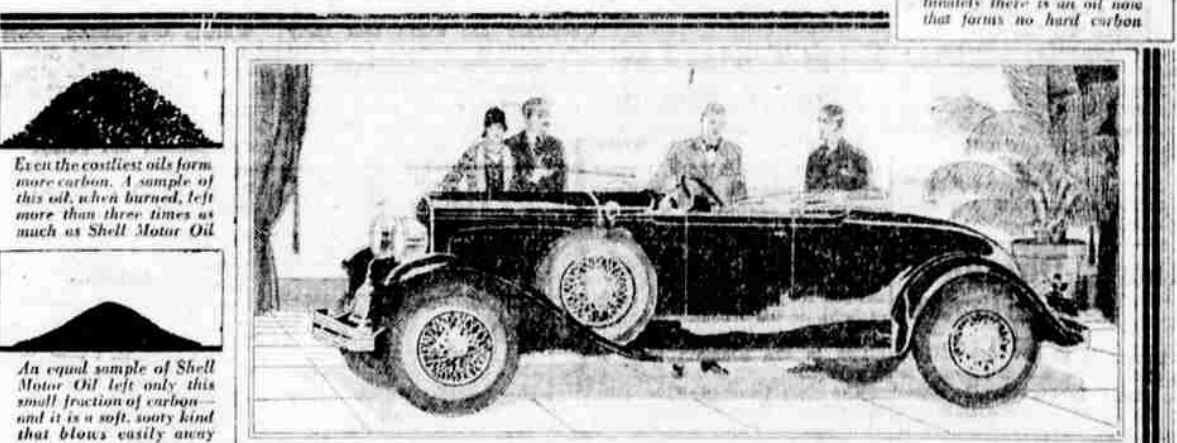
