Red Sox, Senators, Indians, Browns, Robins, Phillies, Cards Win

The Boston Red Sox celebrated their first home game of the season by taking the world's champion New York Yankees into camp by a score of 4 to 2. Big Ed Morris and Heimach, his successor, held the singing Yankees safe.

**Senators Win 4-3**  
The season opened at Philadelphia with a victory for the Washington Senators after a hard fight that went 11 innings. The score was 4 to 3. Hadley allowed only five hits in 9 innings, but was taken out in the tenth when he wobbled and issued a pass.

Joe Sewell's sacrifice fly in the last of the ninth with the bases filled, gave the Cleveland Indians today's game with the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 4.

Lon Blue's homer in the fifth inning gave his team a lead over the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Browns won, 11 to 5.

**Vance Dazzles Again**  
In the National league, Dazzy Vance pitched the Brooklyn Robins to a 3 to 2 victory in eleven innings over the Boston Braves. Vance allowed only six hits.

**Phillies Run Giants**  
The lowly Philadelphia Phillies ruined the New York Giants' opening by taking a 11-inning battle 3 to 1. Friberg's triple in the final inning clinched the game.

St. Louis stopped the Chicago Cubs' winning streak by annexing the final contest of the series, 9 to 6. Blake and Carlson were pounded unmercifully.

## ANGELS START TOWARD TOP

Sacs in Third Place, Seals Lose; Beavers Win Over Seattle

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23. (U. P.)—The Los Angeles Angels started their campaign to regain first place of the Pacific Coast league in good style today when they defeated their successors, the San Francisco Missions, 3 to 2.

Sacramento slipped into third place by beating Oakland, 3 to 0, while the San Francisco Seals, who had held that position, were losing to Hollywood by a score of 3 to 6. Portland beat Seattle, 2 to 0, in the other contest of the day.

The league-leading Missions were outclassed from the start of the first game of the seven-game series here. The Angels had rolled up a total of eight runs before the Missions scored their two in the last of the eighth.

Hollywood likewise gained an early lead over the Seals. It was never less than two runs.

Sacramento and Oakland were tied in the seventh and eighth innings, but Sacramento made three in the first of the ninth to win. Casarella, Portland pitcher, held the Indians to five hits and shut them out.

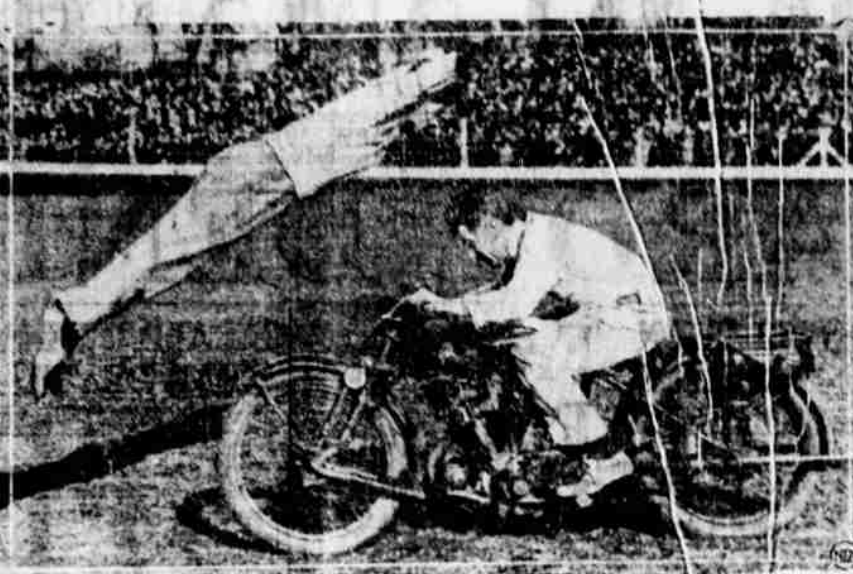

aspect of a broadcasting station, a bank of storage batteries, two three-kilowatt direct-current generators, and the new machine necessitate this change in construction.

The principle of the photo phone is the photo-electric cell, which amplifies light; this amplification rises to over the six million figure, and the outfit in the Pelican will be sufficient size to accommodate an auditorium seating 5,000 persons.

The speakers are of the super-dynamic size, eight in number,

12 inches in diameter and placed on the stage alongside the screen at such angles to give the effect that speech comes directly from the actor's lips.

"The exact opening date of the Pelican with 'talkies' has not been decided upon because of the changes in the building and the uncertainty of the amount of work involved, but the Pelican upon the completion of this unit will be the most modern theatre on the Pacific Coast," barring none," H. days. The other was signalled today in formal report on the farm relief bill to the senate with the amendment plan included as an optional amendment, which the agriculture committee approved yesterday, eight to six.

**Expect Battle**

Because of his opposition to the national origins quota basis, the president is not expected to permit this indefinite delay, which may mean defeat, to stand without a fight. He has begun a fight against the farm relief bill, which is expected to be successful ultimately, though the senate committee over-rode him.

The controversy over the farm relief bill flared up in the senate today as it took up the farm relief bill formally, indicative of wrangling that may last for days and delay final action. The house concluded debate today, and probably will pass its bill Thursday.
