Judge Hardy Says Charges Untrue

Stories Differ
The testimony of Mrs. Lorraine Weichman-Sellaff occupied the greater part of the day's examination of Judge Hardy.

Denying that he had ever met Mrs. Sellaff with the one exception of their conference at his home on August 1, 1926, Judge Hardy told a story widely differing from that related by Mrs. Sellaff when she occupied the witness stand.

"Framing" Denied
The entire tale of "framing" a woman who would testify that she was the "Miss X" who occupied the Carmel cottage with Kenneth G. Orniston was discounted by Judge Hardy.

"The first time I ever heard of a 'Miss X' was two days after Mrs. Sellaff called on me at my home. I then read an item in a Los Angeles paper, stating that Orniston had made an affidavit

regarding his Carmel companion, whom he described as 'Miss X.' It is obvious that I couldn't have discussed a 'Miss X' with Mrs. Sellaff because I know nothing of such a person," said the judge.

Never Said Untrue Words
"I never conversed with anyone regarding the producing of a woman to pose as the 'Miss X' character described in the Orniston affidavit,"
The famous phrase, "lay off the Almee case," which Judge Hardy is accused of saying to one of the grand jurors investigating the McPherson kidnapping episode was never uttered by him, he declared today.

"I never said those words to R. H. W. Brindson, who claims I spoke to him, or anyone else, at any time, or any place," the jurist emphatically declared.

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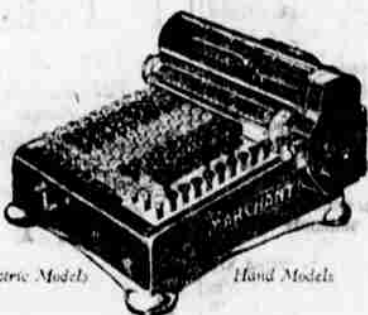
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
