SAN FRANCISCO, April 24. (U.P.)—Less than a game separated the league-leading San Francisco Missions and the second-place Los Angeles Angels tonight after the southerners scored their second straight victory over the leaders, 12 to 6, to feature the Pacific Coast League today.

PORTLAND GAS DEALERS ROW

Tear Up Company Contracts; Hurl Charges At Oil Concerns

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24. (U.P.)—Contracts between major oil companies and many gasoline service station operators became mere scraps of paper today after numerous dealers tore them up "just to show the oil companies what we think of their high-handed methods."

Contract tearing and a liberal application of epithets to the Standard Oil Company of California were high points of an indignation meeting called by the Portland retail gasoline dealers' protective association.

The association made a very plain statement that it had grown weary of assorted tactics of major oil companies in furnishing gasoline at 10 1/2 cents a gallon with contracts up to July 1, and selling to laundries and florists at 13 1/2 cents a gallon. A Revere dealer said Union, Shell and Standard were selling to farmers and "anyone else with a barrel" for 12 1/2 cents a gallon while a Revere dealer said the Union company "is servicing from its trucks on the streets to machines of anyone who will buy from them."

R. B. White, a Portland dealer, was given a rousing cheer by more than 500 service station owners when he said: "Just paint signs off your pumps. Tell the companies that has your contract to go where they don't dare handle gasoline, and we'll all come out all right."

The association adjourned with a cry: "Tear up the contracts, and agreed to charge 20 cents a gallon to motorists from Wednesday on until we're satisfied we can make a living."
