Two months ago this orchestra did not exist. It was explained by Percy Evans, who presided as chairman, and only two of the students now in the orchestra had ever received any musical training. Yesterday they showed the skill which hard practice and love of music can produce.

The seven children in the orchestra range in age from 9 years up, and are pupils of the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades at Midland school. Bankers Must Be Sent to Prison

PORTLAND, April 26, (UP)—Federal Judge McNary today issued an order demanding that Emory Olmstead and J. E. Wheeler appear in court May 15 for commitment to McNeil island penitentiary on sentences imposed when they were found guilty of misapplication of funds of the Northwestern National bank.

The order was issued following receipt of a mandate from the circuit court of appeals at San Francisco, denying their appeal by the United States supreme court.

Olmstead received a sentence of five years and Wheeler three years.

Senate Clears Judge C. A. Hardy

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followed the roll call and when the vote showed him cleared of the first article of impeachment he turned and smiled at his son. The other roll calls followed in rapid succession and when the clerk called the last name on the list the judge sat back in his chair as his attorneys crowded about him, shaking his hands and congratulating him.

Following adjournment of the senate as a court the judge left the senate chambers, proceeding directly to his hotel where he telephoned his wife of the result and then dictated a statement to the press.

Judge Is Happy

The statement said: "I rejoice that after a full, fair and just trial by the senate sitting as a court of impeachment I have been acquitted."

"This is a just verdict and naturally I am happy. I never had any serious doubt as to the outcome of a fair trial."

"The senate heard all the evidence that should be produced and acted judicially and justly. I am grateful to each senator for the careful consideration of the case. This vindication is complete and I and my counsel who have battled so ably for me are most happy at the large vote for acquittal on the several counts."

Vote Is Surprise

Results of the vote on the various articles came as a complete surprise to all at the capital. On no one of the four counts was the majority against the judge and only on the charge of obstructing justice during the McPherson investigation did the poll even approach a majority against him. A two-third vote on any of the articles would have been necessary for impeachment.

The first count accused the jurist of rendering legal services to Angelus Temple while he was judge of the Los Angeles superior court. The vote was 37 for acquittal and 2 for conviction on this article.

21-18 On Almee Count

Obstruction of justice during the investigation of a Mrs. McPherson's kidnapping story formed basis for the second count. The vote was 21 for acquittal and 18 for conviction.

Intimidation of Wallace Moore, former Santa Barbara newspaperman who declared he saw Mrs. McPherson in an automobile with Kenneth G. Orniston near Santa Barbara the night she disappeared, was charged in a fourth article was dismissed with 26 votes for acquittal and 13 for conviction.

WYOMING HIT

CHEYENNE, Wyo., April 26, (UP)—Communications were re-established today, revealing two lives lost and staggering losses to herds of cattle and flocks of sheep in the worst spring blizzard in Wyoming since 1920.

The loss of life and livestock was in addition to more than \$100,000 damage to telephone and telegraph wires, which went down under the combined assault of rain, snow, and sleet.

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the subpoenas until the day I appeared in Sacramento, many ridiculous and sensational statements were issued by the board of managers, forecasting the evidence they expected to produce against me and the terrible things that would befall me when I took the witness stand. The statement led me to believe that I was on trial, rather than Judge Hardy.

"Similar sensational statements have been issued almost daily by the same gentlemen obviously for one purpose—to have their names appear on the front page. Apparently the purpose of these absurd, unfounded statements was to obtain some free advertisement, and I am perfectly justified in this conclusion in view of the fact that it was well known that the man issuing the statements could not substantiate his charges by evidence."

Held Ten Days

"After appearing in Sacramento at great expense and inconvenience I was held there for ten days, while the publicity seekers daily issued reams of propaganda concerning me. Then I was excused by the board of managers, which information I received by reading in the newspapers of a written statement, issued by the board in which they went to some length to tell the world they didn't intend to use me as a witness."

"I thereupon left Sacramento, only to be recalled by the same board of managers after the newspapers had failed to discover my whereabouts."

Says Men Craved Publicity.

"Immediately my name went back on the front page along with the names of certain gentlemen who craved and apparently needed publicity. I finally was placed on the witness stand on rebuttal and asked one or two questions concerning minor details this was done in my opinion for the one and only purpose of attempting to justify the managers in putting the state of California and myself at such great expense."

"I was not admitted while on the witness stand to refute the fabricated stories which the prosecution had so gladly approved and used."

His Prosecutor.

"It is my frank opinion that the managers never intended to use me as a witness and that keeping me under subpoena during the entire trial was a publicity stunt on their part, unworthy of men in whom the people of the state of California reposed the power of dispensing justice."

"Through three years of cruel persecution my faith in God and justice has never been shaken. Through it all the church has gone gloriously and victoriously on and on, and our membership has increased by thousands, while our branch churches are spreading everywhere."

Sustained By Religion.

"The cradle of every great religious movement has been rocked by the hand of persecution, but never has it produced healthy offspring. I have nothing to add or take away from statements formerly issued by me. I have told the truth at all times in every detail."

"As for the silly stories that have been spread concerning my whereabouts on various occasions I can only revert to my former statements and state that such stories are unworthy of an answer."

"People constantly ask me how I have kept through all the barrage of sensational stories concerning me. I have been able to do so, because of my innocence, and my faith in the work of the Master, and I have been strengthened through it all through confidence and loyalty of my 200,000 members and followers."
