objected should be included in the bill. Leaders expected a final vote on the bill by next Saturday and they are confident the administration forces have sufficient votes to defeat the de-benture amendment.

Norris Offers Amendment

The first vote will come on the Norris amendment proposing that the de-benture rate be reduced in case over-production of any commodity exceeds by 20 per cent the average yield of the crop in the past five years. Senator Norris of Nebraska, a republican Smith supporter in the last campaign, hopes by his amendment to eliminate one of Mr. Hoover's arguments that the de-benture plan would cause over-production. His amendment probably will be adopted, perfecting the de-benture clause of the bill.

The question then will come on Republican Leader Watson's amendment to eliminate the de-benture plan entirely. Norris' amendment is planned to get more votes for the de-benture provision. Many senators have said they would like to vote for the plan if some way could be found to prevent over-production. These senators have privately indicated that they do not believe Norris' amendment is sufficient, so it seems that its adoption may not change enough votes to overthrow the administration.

After a call at the White House, Senator Nye, republican, North Dakota, member of the farm bloc, announced late today he was inclined to vote against the de-benture plan of farm relief. He said he believed the bill impeded legislative relief for the farmer. This created a split in the North Dakota delegation, as Senator Frazier supports the proposed bill.

Highway Matters Up at Court Meet

several county roads in timbered lands west of Klamath Falls were approved.

A viewer's and appraiser's report on the amount of damages that should be allowed property owners whose land was used in straightening curves on The Dallas-California highway from the fairgrounds on South Sixth street to the junction of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway was approved by the court.

To Widen Highway

A resolution was also passed declaring the necessity of widening the highway from the south city limits to the fairgrounds from 60 feet, its present width, to 80 feet.

The report of the viewers who were appointed to appraise damages done when the Poe Valley-Mallin and the Edgewood highways were built was read a first time, and passed to second reading.

The county court, at the recommendation of County Engineer Gene Henry, approved the maps for a number of proposed market roads in the Fort Klamath territory. The maps were signed by the court and will now be sent to Salem for the approval and signature of the state market road engineer. The acceptance of these roads will make all roads in the Fort Klamath district market roads.

Grant Permits

A number of permits to haul logs over county roads in the eastern part of the county were granted, subject to the 16,000-pound load limit. It was brought out that the limit includes the weight of the truck and the load combined.

Mr. Cummings, engineer with the Ewauna Box company, appeared before the court and discussed the matter of changing the location of the county road near the town of Sprague River to make a better crossing of the road and a railroad.

One world's record came in the 180-yard high hurdle shuttle race, which Illinois won in 1 minute, 22 seconds. It was the first time the race ever was run here.

UNION CITY, N. J., April 27. (UP)—Three American missionary priests of the Passionist Order have been murdered by bandits in Hunan Province, China, the offices of "The Sign", Passionist Missionary magazine, was advised today in a cable from Hankow.

The Rev. Father Harold Purcell, editor of "The Sign", announced receipt of a message from Arthur Benson in Hankow saying that the priests were killed on April 24 near Chen-Ki. No details were given.
