Cubs Beat Reds, Athletics Overwhelm Yanks 10-1, Johnson Routed

So he arrived in Klamath Saturday and has been in training ever since. Yesterday morning he did four miles on the road and in the afternoon at 5:30 o'clock he quilled his hitting muscles in a hard workout in the Pelican City gym against Mike Daley.

Forbes meets the veteran "Tiger" Cline in the ten-round main event of a great legion card next Friday night.

The sporting editor of this newspaper has sung the praises of recent fights staged in the legion hall, but he is forced to encourage more than ever about the next one. From first to last, it appears to be a great card. The legion and boxing commission disavow another packed house, if for no other reason than that they have been willing to take a financial chance and sign up metropolitan main event talent.

Forbes is a great fighter — fast as a streak, a knockout blow in either hand, and so clever and quick he made Ray McQuillan, well known negro who has shown in Klamath several times, look slow.

Forbes is at the threshold of a great ring career, providing he does not hit a "snag." He is only 23 years old, and above all, appears to have a level head on his shoulders. He is a nice looking youth, with wide shoulders sloping down to narrow and graceful hips. His legs are slim — reminiscent of Jack Dempsey. He has a left hook that cuts like a saber, and a right cross that carries that indefinable quality referred to as the "hook punch." They fall forward when Forbes connects.
