McCloud Mill to Connect With G. N. Extension Plan

That the McCloud River Lumber company intends to extend the line of the McCloud River railroad to Lookout to connect with the extension of the Great Northern and Western Pacific railroads in case they are permitted to build to that point has been announced by D. M. Swope, president of the lumbering concern and the railroad, according to word received here.

Swope declared that his company would aid in the case for the extension of the line. The railroad now operated by the company is used as a logging road from the timber into McCloud where the company has its mills. The company, it is understood, is a part of the Shovel-Hixon organization which has its principal operation at Bend, Oregon, which would be connected with the McCloud mill in case the projected extensions are made.

At the present time the McCloud road has been extended into Modoc county to Gasper meadows where it taps a large tract of the McCloud River Lumber company's timber. To connect this line with the proposed Great Northern extension would be a matter of building only a few miles of line from Gasper meadows to the Modoc county town.

Sentence Jones To Five Years in State's Prison

An appeal for parole failed yesterday when Judge W. M. Duncan sentenced Orville Jones to serve an indeterminate sentence of not to exceed five years following his conviction on the charge of burglarizing a warehouse owned by the Balseger Motor company.

Jones' father, C. R. Jones, testified on his behalf just before sentence was pronounced. The elder Jones said that his son had served 9 months in a reform school for forgery when he was 14 years old, that he had "gone straight" until he committed the crime in Klamath. He assured that his son would not violate the laws of society again.

Harry Bolvin, deputy district attorney, reminded the court that in addition to the Colorado reformatory sentence, that Jones had been convicted in Montana on a minor liquor violation. Jones was represented by W. P. Myers.

Drunken Drivers Meet in Smashup

Two drunken drivers met at the intersection of East Main and Sixth street early Sunday evening. Two badly damaged cars are the result of the collision.

Yesterday Fred H. Reiman and Kelly Thomas, drivers of the cars, were deprived of their driver's license for one year.

Unable to pay fines of \$100, both men were lodged in the city jail for 30 days.

"Lucky that both were drunk, so that some innocent party did not suffer as the result of their intoxicated condition," Keith Ambrose, chief of police, commented.

Crater Lake to Open July First, Colonel States

The official Crater Lake season will open July first, no matter what the snow conditions, and the depth of snow now in the park is about one-third less than the normal for the last ten years.

This was the information received at the chamber of commerce yesterday as a final message from Col. C. G. Thomson, who left yesterday for Yosemite Park to take up his duties as superintendent.

"If normal spring weather prevails from now on the park roads will be open to the lake for auto travel by the third week in June. Additional snow fall or unseasonable cold weather that would retard thawing, would of course make it necessary to remove snow, as is necessary about every other year," Colonel Thomson states.

In general reports from Crater National park indicate that the snow load is about 15 percent less than last year when auto travel set in to the lake on June 2nd. This light precipitation in the Cascades also prevails throughout the mountainous regions of California. The total travel to Crater Lake park last season numbered 113,322 persons, which broke the yearly attendance record in the history of the park, and which record is expected to be far exceeded this year.

State Plans to Bridge Klamath

Plans for a modern new state highway bridge across Klamath river to replace the existing span, are being drawn by the state engineering department, according to word received here last night.

The new bridge will be constructed along the lines of other modern state highway spans in the state. Bids will be opened either in May or June and the structure completed and ready for service several months later. A Skelton, Grants Pass, state highway bridge engineer, arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday to confer with local authorities concerning the work.

Just what will be done with the existing span is not known. Considerable discussion has been voiced over the possibility of utilizing the material to construct a bridge across Klamath river between Massy Point and the Shaw-Bertram Lumber company.

Jordan Awarded School Contracts

Actual work on the first two units of the county school \$150,000 building program, authorized by the county electorate at a special election late last winter, was started yesterday and plans were being laid to open bids on a third construction unit May 9.

Fred Jordan, Klamath Falls contractor, with a combined bid of \$23,648 was given the contract for the first two units—a six-room school at the Weyerhaeuser mill site and a four-room school at Henley. His contract calls for completion of the two projects by August 15 which would allow ample time to prepare the two buildings for the forthcoming school year.

The county school board will open bids May 9 on the proposed construction of a four-room addition to Altamont school.
