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## CHAMBER TO VOTE BY MAIL

Ballots on G. N. Question  
Mailed; Chiloquin For  
Proposed Extension

A referendum on the railroad question which now faces the Klamath residents will be taken by the chamber of commerce, it was decided Tuesday noon at a meeting of the chamber board of directors.

Ballots were mailed out to all members last night. They must be returned by Tuesday, May 7, at 10 a.m.

On the ballot is a resolution offered by the Great Northern and under it a line on which to vote "yes" with no line for a "no" vote. This is taken care of in the brief statement of the Southern Pacific supporters in a statement to appear on the ballot which reads, "Shall the chamber of commerce members remain neutral?" To this is also a "yes" line added.

If the voter favors the chamber of commerce intervention in behalf of the proposed Great Northern extension he should make his mark on the "yes" line. But if he prefers that the chamber should remain neutral in the railroad controversy a cross should be placed on the "yes" line following the neutral statement.

Word was received last night from Chiloquin that the Chiloquin Commercial club held a meeting last Friday evening and voted unanimously to intervene in favor of the Great Northern. A resolution was drawn up and sent to the interstate commerce commission. About 35 were present at the meeting, it was stated.
