

## A'S BEAT RED SOX 24 TO 6

Cards, Pirates; Cincinnati, Cubs Play 13-Inning Tie Games

Main made inroads on the national pastime in both major leagues Wednesday, but most of the games played proved to be of the unusual type. At Boston, the Philadelphia Athletics went on a wild hitting spree and collected 25 hits to overwhelm the Red Sox 24 to 6. The run total was the highest this season and one of the largest in recent baseball history.

At Simmons and Jimmy Foxx led the A's attack with five hits each. Simmons hit three singles, a double and a home run while Foxx had two home runs and three singles.

**Browns Beat Indians**  
The Athletics made ten runs in the sixth inning on seven singles, a double, a home run, two walks and a hit batsman. A double play was necessary to stop the rally.

The St. Louis Browns opened the season in Cleveland by defeating the Indians, 4 to 3.

**Tie in 13 Innings**  
In the National league, the St. Louis Cardinals and the Pittsburgh Pirates battled 13 innings, tied 4 to 4, and then were forced to call it no contest because of darkness. While Sherdel, diminutive Card southpaw, went the entire route for the Red Birds, while the Pirates used Hill, Sweetie and Brann.

Another 13th inning tie battle was staged at Cincinnati, where the Reds and the Cubs had to stop to allow the Cubs to catch a train with the score at 4-all. The game went into extra innings when Cincinnati put on a two-run ninth inning rally with two doubles and a hit batsman.
