The San Francisco Missions, league leaders, maintained a margin of four and one-half games over Los Angeles although they were defeated by the Portland Beavers 5 to 2.

The outstanding individual performance of the day was by Thurston, San Francisco Seal pitcher, who held the Oakland team to two hits and shut them out. The Seals won 9 to 0.

Another shutout was turned in by Crandall, Sacramento pitcher, but he allowed the Los Angeles players eight hits in the contest, which the Senators won, 4 to 0.

Hollywood scored three runs in the seventh and stopped a Seattle rally in the eighth to win the ball game at Los Angeles 4 to 2.

Therefore Oakland, the Seals and Sacramento were tied for third place, half a game behind Los Angeles, and Hollywood trailed those three teams by only half a game.

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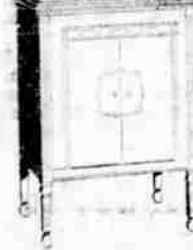
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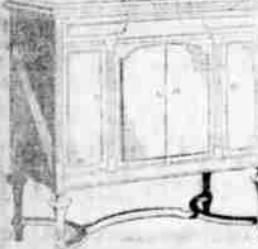
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
