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Yanks on Batting Spree; Braves Win Over Pirates, 5-3

NEW YORK, May 4. (U.P.)—The weather man pointed today and allowed the four western teams of the National League to make their eastern debut after two forced postponements.

The westerners expressed their thanks by winning four out of five games played—two of them by shut-outs.

Braves Beat Pirates

The pace-making Braves scored the only victory for the east, outpointing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5 to 3, at Boston. The Chicago Cubs won two games from Philadelphia, 16 to 0, and 9 to 7. Cincinnati blanked Brooklyn 7 to 0, and St. Louis Cardinals defeated New York, 10 to 7, in 10 innings.

At the same time the eastern American league clubs took their bow in the west and lost two out of three games. Rain prevented the game scheduled between the league leaders, Philadelphia and St. Louis.

Yanks Top Chicago

The New York Yanks tripped Chicago in the only victory for the east, while Boston was losing at Detroit, 2 to 1, and Cleveland was checking Washington, 4 to 3.

The Yanks found themselves for the first time today—and what they found was plenty, as far as batting power is concerned. Lou Gehrig tied the world's record for home runs in one game by counting three off Faber, McKinn and Dugan, of the Chicago pitching staff.

Three in Row
In addition the Yanks started the world in the seventh inning with three consecutive home runs, off the bats of Ruth, Gehrig and Mousie in that order.

The victory of the Braves, while rather unexpected, was clearly earned. Sheild took the box for Boston and held the Pirates to eight hits, while his mates gave him errorless support. The Braves gained eleven safeties off Petty and Hill and Pittsburgh threw in a misplay for good measure.

Cubs Take Two

The New York Giants fought desperately but vainly to keep from falling into second division. Their two-run rally, which tied the score in the last of the ninth, was wiped out when the Cards turned in three runs in the first of the tenth.

Chicago was under in danger at Philadelphia in the first game, although the Phillies reached Malone for ten hits. Malone kept them in check and was unbeatable in the pinches. Charley Root pitched the second and allowed the Phillies 12 hits. Seven runs were the best Shotton's men could make of that total, however, and the Cubs converted 9 hits into as many runs, to win. Red Lucas set Brooklyn down with three hits and the Reds batted out their margin of victory at leisure.
