Irrigators for Refinance Plan At Grants Pass

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 4. (AP)—Land owners of the Grants Pass Irrigation district voted approval last night of the steps taken by the district bondholders' committee and the state reclamation committee for the refinancing of the district. The land owners, assembled in a mass meeting, asked that the issuance of refunding bonds be voted upon at once.

Rhea Luper, state engineer, and H. D. Norton, attorney for the district and chairman of the bondholders' committee, outlined the steps taken for the refinancing, which now depends upon the district vote on the refunding of its completion.

Under the terms agreed upon the bondholders plan to decrease interest from 6 per cent to 4 per cent for five years. Maturities are extended from ten years to forty years.

Luper said the state is willing to cancel the indebtedness, amounting to almost a half million dollars, incurred through state payment of bond interest during a five year period.

Land owners attending the meeting were unanimously in favor of the refunding issue.

The Grants Pass district is the first in the state to be refinanced under the laws passed by the last legislature.

To Settle Fish Squabble in Court

THE DALLES, Ore., May 4. (UP)—A test case to determine rights of anglers on the Columbia river will result from the asserted attack of three commercial fishermen on two sportsmen, it was learned today.

Frank and H. Isel and W. C. Dons will face preliminary hearing Friday on charges of assault and battery on C. H. Dean and W. H. Gillespie, who claim they were beaten while standing on government property at Celilo Falls fishing for salmon.

Both sides plan to appeal from verdict, the sportsmen contending that the state game commission's ruling, designating the banks of navigable rivers between the high and low water mark as public highways, open to anglers.

(UP)—"Buster" Gehrig, heavy hitting Yankee first sacker, who has been with the "also rans," in the home run column this year, suddenly jumped into the lead of both leagues when he clouted three homers in today's game against the White Sox, bringing his total for the season to six, and equalling the record for homers in one game.

Babe Ruth and Bob Meusel, also chalked up circuit clouts for the Yanks and Cissel added one for the Sox.

Gehrig knocked his long ones in the second, seventh and ninth innings off three different pitchers. In the seventh the Babe got his third homer of the season. Gehrig, up next, followed suit, and then Meusel, who follows Gehrig in the batting order, clouted out still another, three in a row.

The Yanks won 11 to 9.
