Mrs. Williams was arrested and brought to Klamath Falls with her husband but was freed yesterday and allowed to return to Beatty.

Spokane Chamber Favors Proposal Of G. N. Railroad

The Spokane chamber of commerce has been authorized by the Interstate commerce commission to intervene in active support of the first Northern-Western Pacific project to construct their proposed 200-mile "connecting" railroad between Klamath Falls, Oregon, and Paxon or Keddle, California. The Spokane chamber of commerce, according to the official announcement received at Western Pacific general offices, San Francisco, is now to be treated as a directly interested party in the matter of the applications for the certificates of public convenience and necessity which must be obtained before construction of the railroad which will connect the two railroad systems may begin.

The Spokane chamber is a civic body, organized and maintained by the business men of Spokane and its surrounding trade territory for the purpose of forwarding and promoting the growth, expansion and development of the trade territory in the region of which Spokane is the economic center. Spokane is situated on the main transcontinental line of the Great Northern Railway in eastern Washington, and has a population of approximately 120,000. It is also the industrial and distributing center of the region commonly known as the Inland Empire containing a population of more than 600,000.

May 10, 1869. Promontory. Two queer little locomotives with tiny brass chimneys in the Utah sun. Around them a crowd—personages and laborers, bearded men for the most part, for heads were the rule then.
