Larry French, a husky recruit from Portland, Ore., pitched the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3 to 2 victory over the New York Giants. It was a close game and required an extra inning to decide. Pie Traynor's single brought L. Waner in with the winning run after the latter had doubled in the tenth.

Lefty O'Doul played the hero role at Philadelphia by lifting a homer over the right field wall with two men on base in the eighth inning and giving the last place Phillies a 6 to 4 win over the Cincinnati Reds.

Charlie Grimm, with two home runs helped the Chicago Cubs defeat the Brooklyn Dodgers, 9 to 4. Stephenson also had a homer and Bob Grace starred with three singles.

The Boston Braves took the Cardinals for a ride in the opening game of the series, 5 to 1, after a see-saw contest. An eighth inning rally netted the Braves four runs.

Bob Messel smashed out a double in the ninth inning of today's Yankee-Browns' game, scoring Ruth and Gehrig. The score was 6 to 5 for the Yankees. Ruth got his fifth homer of the season.

In their first meeting this season, the Boston Red Sox defeated the Cleveland Indians 5 to 4. The Chicago White Sox beat Philadelphia 4 to 2, after losing four straight. Bob Grove, the Athletics Southpaw, was hit hard.

Washington went down to defeat in their first meeting with the Detroit Tigers, 3 to 2. The Senators staged a ninth inning rally but fell one short of tying the score.

Diegel Leads Qualifiers for British Open Golf

MURFIELD, Scotland, May 7. (UP)—Americans were in the van at Murfield today. Leo Diegel, White Plains professional, winning the qualifying medal with a brilliant low aggregate of 144.

Three strokes behind Diegel and still well out in front of the field of 163 qualifiers in the British open golf championship came Little Bobby Cruickshank, with 147.

Bringing up the rear of the qualifying ranks, however, were some of the other American pros—Jim Barnes, Johnny Farrell, Al Espinosa and Ed Dudley, the last named finishing in a tie for last place and just getting in with 162.

All 16 professionals from the United States and George von Elm, former amateur champion, qualified.

The weather which took such a heavy toll of strokes on Monday improved today, but the golf, for the most part, failed to follow suit. Diegel's 70 over the championship course at Muirfield was the lone outstanding performance of the second day.

The 163 qualifiers will set out Wednesday on the 72-hole medal play test, and the field will be reduced further Thursday night when all those more than 14 strokes behind the leader must drop out.

Schmeling Signs To Fight Basque

NEW YORK, May 7. (UP)—The way appeared clear today for the meeting of Max Schmeling of Germany and Paulino Uzcudun of Spain, in the feature bout of the Annual Milk Fund show here, June 27. After the New York state athletic commission granted the German heavyweight permission to sign his own contract, Schmeling had refused to accept the signature of Arthur Balow, his recognized manager.

The commission ordered the managers' share of the purse turned over to it for distribution among the four men who own interests in the Schmeling contract.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7. (U P)—Sensational playing of the San Francisco Missions continued today and they advanced six full games ahead of the second place Los Angeles Angels in the Pacific Coast League.

The Missions came from behind to trounce the Sacramento Senators, 8 to 7, while the Angels were losing to the Portland Beavers, 17 to 9.

San Francisco's Seals and the Oakland club both won and the Hollywood Stars lost, so the two bay region teams remained in a tie but moved up to third place, forcing the Stars into fifth position. The Seals had little trouble in beating Seattle, 4 to 3. Eight runs by the Beavers in the second inning dampened enthusiasm of the Los Angeles fans so the contest at Sacramento was the most exciting of the day. The Missions overcame a two-run lead by Sacramento with five runs in the fourth and fifth and made three more in the seventh. Then the Senators scored five times in the last three innings to keep the result in doubt until the final out.

There were 21 errors in the circuit during the day, Hollywood being the chief offender with four.
