

LONGER LIFE MEDICS' AIM

Noted Physicians Discuss
Problem At Meeting
In San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 9. (A. P.)—Medical science does not have as its goal a race of centenarians, but is vitally interested in assuring the average person a life span greater than the present average of 55 years, according to noted physicians and surgeons attending the 58th annual gathering of the California Medical Association.

To this end leaders in the medical profession, successful in their battle against most of the infectious diseases and increasingly successful in decreasing infant mortality by teaching proper care of babies are consolidating their gains along these lines and turning to the problem offered by cancer, heart trouble and kidney disease.

Much work already has been done along these lines, but Dr. Robert C. Coffee, noted surgeon and head of the Portland Surgical hospital, advocated regular physical examination of all persons over 40, as those who have passed that mark are the principal victims of these chronic maladies. Dr. Coffee termed the three classes of ailments, "degenerative" maladies because their progress causes the organs they attack to break down.

Maladies Increase
While stating that there has been an increase in the chronic maladies, Dr. Coffee expressed the belief that the increase is caused by the fact that more people reach the age of 40 now than before the average life span was increased.

In advocating regular examinations Dr. Coffee pointed out that by these methods the symptoms of the maladies can be detected and proper steps taken to combat the disease. He drew this parallel:

"You wouldn't think of driving your automobile if it had a bad knock in the engine. But people go around with equivalent of a bad knock in their physical makeup and declare they have the courage to bear it without treatment."

Dr. Burrows Talks
Dr. Montrose Burrows, formerly of the Harvard research laboratory and now of the Pasadena hospital, said that maternity does not tend to shorten the life of a normal woman.

"On the contrary," he said, "child bearing tends to strengthen a woman. I have just been attending a case of a ninety-year-old woman, the mother of 13 children. She suffered a broken leg and it needed amputation. That indicates that maternity does not adversely affect the normal woman."

Not only is the normal woman stronger after the experience of childbirth but after the convalescence comes the period in which she is more beautiful than she ever was before, Dr. Burrows added.

Doctors at the convention were generally in agreement on the fact that school teaching is the most nerve-racking occupation for a woman.

Woman's Wage Is On Down Scale

WASHINGTON, May 9. (U. P.)—The wages of women industrial workers have decreased in the last five years despite "national prosperity" and women are constantly being thrown out of work by new machinery and more efficient methods, delegates to the national women's trade union league agreed at their annual meeting here today.

Official figures showing an increase in wages are inaccurate because they fail to take into account the unemployed and the part time workers.

Substitution of automatic telephone exchanges for operators and machine made needles for hand made and the rapidly changing women's styles were cited by speakers as some of the causes of unemployment.

The elimination of books and maps from ladies' frocks was held responsible for throwing thousands of women out of work.

Youth Said Dead Reported Alive

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9. (A. P.)—An overturned canoe in Lake Washington at Seattle, rented by Jack Hillier, 19, of Los Angeles, a student at the University of Washington, led to the belief that he had drowned. But Portland police today reported him alive and well.

John Thompson, Portland salesman and a friend of Hillier, said he talked to Jack at 9 a. m. yesterday. The boy was dressed in hiking clothes and was on his way to Los Angeles, Thompson reported. Thompson and Hillier have been friends for many years.

Price of Wheat Declines Steadily Reports Indicate

CHICAGO, May 9. (A. P.)—Wheat values ebbed to new low levels on the Chicago market today.

Opening a bit firmer than yesterday's closing quotations, prices quickly dropped off as traders evidenced discouragement with the failure to break the log of an over-supplied market. Yesterday's buyers were on the selling side today, and at 11 a. m. wheat had sagged to 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 below the previous close.

This unprecedented break, that has sent wheat sliding 50 cents from the peak price of the year, has failed to stimulate export demand. Foreign buyers have ignored American wheat in favor of Canada or the Argentine, where the prices have met the competition of the huge carry-over from the 1928 United States crop, and the trade was beginning to feel that the only incentive to demand for the old crop will be a heavy

loss to growing North American or European crops. Emergency reduction of domestic freight rates to facilitate movement of the surplus to the seaboard apparently has gone unnoticed.

MOIR BANKER'S DEATH

LOS ANGELES, May 9. (U. P.)—J. E. Fishburn, vice-chairman of the board of directors of the Bank of America, who died in his home after an illness of six months, was mourned here today. He had been a resident of California for 40 years and was well known in banking circles.

Portland Group Forms Air Line

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9. (A. P.)—Officials of the company announced that articles of incorporation for Bolham Air Transport, Inc., were filed in Salem today by Alfred P. Kelley, Portland attorney and one of the incorporators. Capitalization was given as \$25,000. Other incorporators are Charles J. Kamm and Richard E. Bolham.

The company has announced plans for an air passenger service between Victoria, B. C., and San Francisco, with Portland as its headquarters. Bolham recently resigned from the Union Air Lines and West Coast Air Transport.

Kelley said negotiations are under way to obtain connections with Los Angeles and other southwestern cities. Tri-motored, all-metal planes will be used.

Gas War Believed Definitely Over

SAN FRANCISCO, May 9. (U. P.)—Virtually all agencies of San Francisco, selling gasoline to retail trade had increased their price to 20 cents a gallon last night, indicating definite close of the gasoline price war that has been waged for many months.

Only a few still sold the commodity for 17 cents a gallon, which is only one cent above the wholesale price. There have been numerous indications in recent weeks that the 17 cent rate might be cut but the action today means cessation of all hostilities for the present.

FIRE DESTROYS YACHT

LONG BEACH, Calif., May 9. (U. P.)—The yacht Vagabond, one of the most luxuriously furnished on the California coast, was gutted by fire today. Flames ate away the interior of the craft. No one was aboard when the flames of ignominy for 17 hours a gallant, known origin broke out. Lee Doyle, owner, placed the loss at the \$20,000 cost of \$15,000.
