

CANZONERI IS GIVEN DECISION

Routis' Title Not at Stake; Decision Is Boomed By Many

CHICAGO, May 10. (UP)—Tom Canzoneri, New York, was given the referee's decision over Andre Routis of France, world's featherweight champion, in a 10-round non-title bout here tonight.

Although the victory did not win back his title, Canzoneri partially avenged a 15-round beating which Routis gave him in New York when he took the featherweight title from Tony Canzoneri came in over the featherweight limit and Routis' crown consequently was not at stake.

Both Canzoneri and Routis fought a plucky, willing battle, and a draw would not have been an unfair decision. Many booed the verdict.

In the tenth round, Routis came back in the second and for the first time that Tony has been fighting in Chicago made Canzoneri clinch. The third and fourth were great rounds, with Routis running and Tony jabbing. They were even.

In the fifth, Routis seemed to think he was his low but when he was told to keep fighting, came back with a smile. He had the round up to the time that the foul occurred but seemed content to rest and let Tony take the shade. Andre came out from in the sixth and took the round by a big margin. The seventh was even, Canzoneri took the eighth and the last two were even.

In the preliminaries Otto von Porst, Norway, knocked out Jack de Hare, Holland, in the second round; and Armando Santiago, hard-hitting Cuban, knocked out "Honeyboy" Finnekan, Boston, in the sixth round.

SEATTLE WINS OVER SEALS

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10. (UP)—The league leading San Francisco Giants of the Pacific Coast league won their series with Sacramento today by defeating the Senators, 9 to 2, to make it four in a row.

Los Angeles remained six games behind the leaders but improved their advantage over the San Francisco Seals and Oakland, who are tied for third place, to two full games. The Angels beat Portland, 4 to 3, while Seattle was defeating the Seals, 6 to 2, and Hollywood was trouncing Oakland, 19 to 3.

The victories of the Missions and Hollywood were impressive, but the other two games were close and hard fought.

Seattle tied the score with one run in the ninth inning and then made three runs in the first of the tenth to win its first game of the week. The Angels were trailing at the end of the seventh inning but made two in the eighth to gain the one run margin over Portland.

The Missions started out ahead and stayed there but the Oaks made three runs in the first and held the advantage until Hollywood made four in the fifth, Oakland meanwhile being held scoreless after the first session.

HAGEN WINS BRITISH OPEN

Eight Americans Finish in First Ten Places; Britons Fourth

MURFIELD, Scotland, May 10. (UP)—While half a mile blowing out of the North sea, blowing away the last vestige of a disheveled opposition, Walter Hagen, imperious and debonair, successfully defended the British open golf championship today with a low aggregate of 292 strokes.

The blustering winds which swept Murfield's historic fairways, combined with the ruthless par golf of the champion, served to dishearten the opposition and one contender after another fell away until Hagen stood alone, six strokes out in front.

It was Walter's fourth championship since he won at Sandwich in 1922 and proved by far his easiest triumph. He won today because he played steadily, and let the others do the worrying.

The other American professionals exacted a tremendous revenge for their recent Ryder Cup defeat, eight golfers from the United States finishing in the first ten.

Johnny Farrell, American open champion, finished with 258, and Leo Diegel, who holds the P. G. A. and Canadian titles, was third with 259.

Tied for fourth place with cards of 260 were Abe Mitchell and Percy Allis, the only British golfers to finish within 14 strokes of the champion. Upset by the key blasts from the sea, they were never dangerous challengers once Hagen struck his stride.

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5 to 1 Shot Wins In Finish Stretch Of Great Race

BALTIMORE, Md., May 10. (UP)—Walter J. Salmon's Dr. Freehand, ridden by Jockey Louis Schaefer, captured the 38th running of the rich Preakness Stakes today, finishing a length ahead of Charles Graffanini's Minotaur in a driving finish which brought a crowd of 48,000 to its feet.

Back in eighth place passing the three-quarter mile mark, Dr. Freehand came on with a burst of speed which sent the chestnut colt into second place behind the leader, Minotaur, going into the stretch. In the stretch's battle Dr. Freehand bore Minotaur down and finished going away.
