

BENTON SHUTS OUT CUBS 6-0

Haines Strikes Out Two,
Wins Game for Cards;
Yankees Lose

The New York Giants returned to their role as pennant contenders Saturday when Larry Benton held Chicago to two hits at the Polo grounds and became the first pitcher to shut out the hard hitting Cubs this year.

Although still in sixth place, the Giants looked formidable indeed and their six to nothing victory left no doubt as to their right to the win. Terry counted four of the Giant runs in the eighth inning with a home run with the bases full.

Haines 100 Per Cent

The outstanding pitching feat of the day, however, was turned in by Jesse Haines of the St. Louis Cardinals, who with the thing and winning runs on base in the last of the ninth, struck out the next two batters on his pitched balls to retire the side and give his team a 2 to 2 victory at Brooklyn.

The Boston Braves went into the third inning at Boston and counted eight runs off Donohue and Kelp, paving the way for their 5 to 2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Philadelphia blasted four Pittsburgh pitchers for 14 hits to win on their home lot, 11 to 6.

The Tigers battered four Yankee pitchers all over the field for 21 hits, bunching a goodly number of them in the third, when they scored six runs. Franklin High Wins Big Meet

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

A RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE WILFORD AVENUE FROM UPHAM STREET TO DELTA STREET; UPHAM STREET, DONALD STREET AND FULTON STREET FROM WORDEN AVENUE TO WILFORD AVENUE, TO BE KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 73.

The City Engineer, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 23rd day of April, 1928, filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of improving Wilford Avenue from Upham Street to Delta Street; Upham Street, Donald Street, and Fulton Street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue, to be known as Improvement Unit No. 73, and the council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that the said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portions of said streets, being the plans, specifications and estimates, filed herein on the 23rd day of April, 1928, be, and the same are hereby approved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates.

Said improvement to consist more particularly of paving and improving said portions of said streets as follows:

This project consists of improving Wilford Avenue from Upham Street to Delta Street; Upham Street, Donald Street, and Fulton Street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue, together with four-foot sidewalks and curbs. Storm sewers and appurtenances will be constructed where necessary to properly dispose of surface water. Necessary sewer house connections will be constructed where necessary to prevent cutting of the macadam. All streets are to be improved 24 feet in width.

The estimated cost of all classes of improvement, embracing all work and material for the complete improvement of said project, for each type of said improvement being as follows:

Broken stone type "A" macadam, \$11,221.64; broken stone type "B" macadam, \$11,961.56; broken stone type "C" 212, 126.62; said estimates in other event to include engineering supervision, advertising, clerical assistance, and unforeseen contingencies. Said estimates to also include the construction of catch basins, curbs, sidewalks and metal reinforcement rods.

GREAT RACE NEXT SUNDAY

Many Fast Colts Entered
in Fifty-Fifth Annual
Kentucky Derby

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 11. (UP)—A field of prime three-year-olds will contest the 55th renewal of the American Derby at Churchill Downs a week from today.

While Col. E. R. Bradley's Blue Larkspur stands out as a certain favorite, horsemen admitted tonight that the derby is more open than in years. At least half a dozen three-year-olds will find strong support.

Next in public favor to Blue Larkspur is Clyde Van Dusen, owned by H. P. Gardner.

Clyde Van Dusen's stock went up when he won the sixth race at Louisville today in convincing fashion from a field that included several derby candidates.

The colt was odds-on in the betting at 51 cents to the dollar and won as his backers anticipated. He finished a length and a half in front of Martin Eton's Port Harlow and was not even extended, beating his field like a champion. Clyde Van Dusen ran the 4 1/2 furlongs in the fair time of 1:19.4-5.

Walter J. Salmon's Dr. Freedom, by his impressive victory in the Freshman at Pimlico yesterday, has assumed overnight the position of a formidable threat from the east. Dr. Freedom showed distance running ability and courage in the Freshman and probably will vie with Clyde Van Dusen for second choice after Blue Larkspur.

Blue Larkspur is considered a fit candidate to succeed Colonel Bradley's Rubbing Over, which won the 1928 derby.
