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BERKELEY, Calif., May 15, (UP)—William Wallace Campbell, an outstanding educator and president of the University of California for the past seven years, announced at an alumni meeting here today that he will retire July 1, 1930.

President Campbell recalled that when he accepted his position as president of the university he stipulated that he would be permitted to leave as he reached the age at which he would ordinarily retire if in some other position.

Under the rules of the university, that age, in his case, will be 68, his next birthday being April 14, 1930. He will retire at the end of the following semester.

Federal Building Site Deed Filed

Plans are being drafted by the government at the present time for the new federal building which will be erected on the site, which has been approved by government agents. It is expected that a bill appropriating the necessary funds for the construction will be introduced at the next session of congress by delegates from Oregon.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 15, (UP)—Death toll from activities of the city's gangsters in the past six months was increased to eight today when Frank Finney, alias "Goofy" Finney, was killed in a fight during which witnesses claim he was the aggressor.

"Goofy" dropped from a bullet allegedly fired by William Mitchell, cook in the cafe where the altercation occurred, and Mitchell was arrested on the charge.

Finney was convicted recently as a machine gun expert who accompanied trucks operated by rum runners.

Witnesses said "Goofy" was quarrelsome when he entered the restaurant, and it was noticeable when he reached for his hip pocket for a gun after words with the cook.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

A RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE WILFORD AVENUE, FROM UPHAM STREET TO DELTA STREET, APHAM STREET, DONALD STREET AND FULTON STREET FROM WORDEN AVENUE TO WILFORD AVENUE, TO BE KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 79.

The City Engineer, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 29th day of April, 1929, filed plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Wilford Avenue from Upham street to Delta street; Upham street, Donald street, and Fulton street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue, to be known as Improvement Unit No. 79, and the council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory,

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that the said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portions of said street, being the plans, specifications and estimates, filed herein on the 29th day of April, 1929, be, and the same are hereby approved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement to consist more particularly of paving and improving said portions of said streets as follows:

This project consists of improving Wilford Avenue from Upham street to Delta street; Upham street, Donald street and Fulton street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue with broken stone type "A", "B", or "C" macadam, together with four-foot sidewalks and curbs. Storm sewers and appurtenances will be constructed where necessary to properly take care of surface water. Sanitary sewer house connections will be constructed where necessary to prevent cutting of the macadam. All streets are to be improved 24 feet in width.

The estimated cost of all classes of improvement, embracing all work and material for the complete improvement of said project, for each type of said pavement being as follows:

Broken stone type "A" macadam, \$11,221.04; broken stone type "B" macadam, \$11,941.65; broken stone type "C" \$12,126.62; said estimates in either event to include engineering supervision, advertising, clerical assistance, and unforeseen contingencies. Said estimates to also include the construction of catch basins, curbs, sidewalks and metal reinforcement rods.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Common Council that the property lying within the boundaries hereinafter described be and the same is hereby declared to be benefited, to-wit:

Beginning at the most southerly corner of lot 26, block 14, Fairview addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southerly at right angles to Upham street to the northerly line of 11th street; thence northerly along the northerly line of 11th street to the southerly line of Upham street; thence northerly across Upham street and along the easterly line of Worden Avenue to the southerly line of Delta street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Delta street to and across lot 5, block 12, Fairview addition to the said city to a point on the easterly line of said block 12, 25 feet southerly from the most northeasterly corner of lot 5, of said block 12; thence southerly along the easterly line of said block 12 to the most southeasterly corner of lot 26, of said block 13; thence westerly along the southerly line of said lot 26, to the point of beginning.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all of the aforesaid property included in the boundaries above described, be, and the same is hereby declared to be benefited and assessed for the expense of said improvement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Monday, the 3rd day of June, 1929, at the hour of 8 o'clock, p.m., at the council chambers in the City Hall of Klamath Falls, Oregon, be fixed as the time and place for the hearing of objections and remonstrances against said property improvement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Police Judge, be, and he is hereby directed to cause notice of such hearing to be published as provided by the city charter of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Congress To Recess
After the conference, Speaker Longworth also announced that the senate will recess for the month of June, while its finance committee is considering the tariff bill, and that the house plans to recess for June and July while the tariff bill is going through the legislative mill in senate committee and senate.

It was generally believed to-night that the steering committee would take the milder course and send the measure to conference. There was a report about the cloakrooms that President Hoover had indicated a desire for this course in order that there be no strife between the two houses.

Both farm relief and tariff battles were centered in the house today, and while leaders hurried themselves over the farm measure, opposition broke to the provision in the measure giving the president and the secretary of the treasury broader powers in changing rates under the flexible provision.
