

Tornadoes Blow In Southwest, Many Injured

DUNCAN, Okla., May 17. (UP)—A small tornado struck the farm home of W. S. Hinkle near here today, injuring three persons.

Hinkle's wife, a relative named George Hinkle, and a 12-year-old son were in a hospital here tonight. Physicians said they were struck by falling timbers.

DALLAS, Tex., May 17. (UP)—Wind storms over northern Texas today injured at least three persons, blew down buildings in several communities and damaged communication lines.

Two small boys were cut by flying glass when a small twister hit the schoolhouse at Electra, Tex., at Wichita Falls Mrs. C. H. Dandridge was struck by flying timber while trying to reach home after the storm had struck.

'Denver Mike' Is Hoboes' New King

SANTA ANA, Calif., May 17. (UP)—Denver Mike, wherever he may go, is king of the United States hoboes tonight.

J. Leon Lazarowitz, who was king of the hobo here today and appointed the wandering Denver Mike his successor. He confessed he was in ignorance of his successor's whereabouts.

Karl Lenn, tired of the repressions placed upon royalty, so he relinquished his power to Denver Mike, who once more, just as rollicking hobo heading for Vinland.

Last Rebel Chief Runs for Border

MEXICO, May 17. (UP)—Federal authorities reported tonight Gen. Marcelino Caraveo, deposed Chihuahua governor, and last rebel chief in Mexico, was speeding toward Bosque Bonito, to cross the international boundary line into the United States at Fort Hancock, Texas.

Federal soldiers have been sent out to attempt to cut off his escape, it was announced.

Ship Wreckage Found in Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile, May 17. (UP)—The wreckage of a ship believed to have been the Perico, due here from Valparaiso several days ago, was found close to the Valparaiso bay today.

The vessel was an 800-ton craft. The number of men aboard was not known.

TOWN WITHOUT POLICE CHIEF

WINSLOW, Ariz., May 17. (UP)—Winslow tonight for the first time in many years had no chief of police.

The city council, in special session, abolished the office of chief, discharged one patrolman, and appointed Chief C. W. Harp regular day policeman and Cube Neill, night patrolman.

Both are on equal salary basis and both are accountable only to the city council, according to tonight's action.

Rush Guardsmen To Blast Scene

ELIZABETHTON, Tenn., May 17. (UP)—Six cars of deputy sheriffs and national guardsmen were rushed to Carter, Tenn., four miles from here on the Stoney Creek road tonight when a dynamite blast was reported there, accompanied by gun shots.

According to police reports here, no one was injured, and no great damage done. The explosion was believed to be attempts on the part of the textile strike sympathizers to intimidate mill workers.

Tonight's explosion was the fourth of the past week which also numbered many acts of strike violence and two incendiary blazes and rioting among union strikers and national guardsmen.

Famous Singer Of Opera Dies

BERLIN, May 17. (UP)—Lilli Lehmann, 51, famous opera singer, died today.

Lilli Lehmann was a dramatic soprano, one of the greatest when at the height of her career in the '90's. She made her debut at the Metropolitan opera house in New York in 1885. In the next 15 years she sang frequently in the United States. In the last 25 years, however, she had been more in the public eye as a teacher of famous singers. Geraldine Farrar was one who studied under her.

Debenture Plan Killed for Time By House Action

WASHINGTON, May 17. (UP)—President Hoover's forces in the house sent the debenture farm relief plan to at least a temporary grave today when they referred the farm bill to a conference committee made up largely of house and senate opponents of this form of agricultural aid.

The conference will eliminate the debenture and report back a measure conforming closely to the president's program.

The bill was sent to conference by adoption of a resolution by Chairman Snell of the house rules committee. The vote, 249 to 119, was along almost strictly partisan lines, democrats opposing it with very few exceptions and republicans voting for it with one exception, Rep. LaGuardia, New York.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION

A RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE WILFORD AVENUE FROM UPHAM STREET TO DELTA STREET; UPHAM STREET, DONALD STREET AND FULTON STREET FROM WORDEN AVENUE TO WILFORD AVENUE, TO BE KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 79.

The City Engineer, pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having on the 29th day of April, 1929, filed plans, specifications and estimates for the cost of improving Wilford Avenue from Upham street to Delta street; Upham street, Donald street, and Fulton street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue, to be known as Improvement Unit No. 79, and the council having taken the same under advisement and finding said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that the said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of said portions of said street, being the plans, specifications and estimates, filed herein on the 29th day of April, 1929, be, and the same are hereby approved, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve said portions of said streets in accordance with said plans, specifications and estimates. Said improvement to consist more particularly of paving and improving said portions of said streets as follows:

This project consists of improving Wilford Avenue from Upham street to Delta street; Upham street, Donald street, and Fulton street from Worden Avenue to Wilford Avenue with broken stone type "A", "B", or "C" macadam, together with four-foot sidewalks and curbs. Storm sewers and appurtenances will be constructed where necessary to properly take care of surface water. Sanitary sewer house connections will be constructed where necessary to prevent cutting of the macadam. All streets are to be improved 24 feet in width.

The estimated cost of all classes of improvement, embracing all work and material for the complete improvement of said project, for each type of said pavement being as follows:

Broken stone type "A" macadam, \$11,221.04; broken stone type "B" macadam, \$11,961.56; broken stone type "C" macadam, \$12,582.52; said estimates in either event to include engineering supervision, advertising, clerical assistance, and unforeseen contingencies. Said estimates also include the construction of catch basins, curbs, sidewalks and metal reinforcement roads.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Common Council that the property lying within the boundaries heretofore described be, and the same is hereby declared to be benefited, to-wit:

Beginning at the most southerly corner of lot 25, block 13, Fairview addition to the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon; thence southerly at right angles to Upham street to the northerly line of 11th street; thence northerly along the northerly line of 11th street to the southerly line of Upham street; thence northerly across Upham street and along the easterly line of Worden Avenue to the southerly line of Delta street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Delta street to and across lot 5, block 13, Fairview addition to the said city to a point on the easterly line of said block 13,

ONE KILLED, 24 HURT IN CRASH

SPOKANE, Wash., May 17. (UP)—One man was killed and 24 persons were injured when a touring motor coach crashed into the rear end of an eastbound freight train near here today.

E. P. Cooper, 50, of Spokane, conductor on the freight train, was killed instantly. Mrs. Susan Miller, of Ramsey, Idaho, suffered a possible fracture of the skull. Two other passengers suffered concussions of the brain, while 21 others had minor injuries.

Fire Destroys Damascus Dairy

PORTLAND, Ore., May 17. (UP)—The Damascus dairy farm buildings at Holbrook, Ore., near here were destroyed by fire of undetermined origin today, which raged for more than three hours.

Two horses entered in the last International Livestock Exposition and three work horses died in the blaze and a prize bull was burned so badly that it was killed later.

Damage to the buildings was estimated at more than \$22,500. No estimate was made of the loss of machinery or value of the livestock destroyed.
