Fishing Tackle
Of Humphrey's
Found by River

THE DALLES, Ore., May 17
(UP)—The fish basket and land-
ing net of Lester W. Humphrey,
former United States attorney
for Oregon, were found today
north of the railroad bridge
across the Deschutes river at
North Junction where he was
believed to have fished Tuesday
while fishing.

The articles were identified
by Humphrey's son, Lester Hum-
phrey Jr., the straps of the
basket were buckled, indicating
the possibility that it had slipped
over Humphrey's head as he
was struggling in the river.
An airplane, police dogs and
many additional searches, in-
cluding members of the American
Legion posts in Maupin, Prince-
ville, Bend and Redmond, were
pressed into the hunt. Hope was
expressed that the plane, flying
low, might be able to locate
Humphrey's body below water
because of the white rubber
waders he was wearing.

Ex-Gang Leader
Social Dependent

WATSONVILLE, Calif., May
17 (UP)—Society which Bob
Dalton once preyed upon as lead-
er of the Dalton bandit gang, no-
torious desperadoes of the Texas
panhandle, Oklahoma and Cali-
fornia in the late '80s, has joined
to help him when he is feeble
from old age and penitence.
Dalton was recognized here to-
day by Arthur Dresser, who was
a victim of the gang on Febru-
ary 1, 1891.

The gang leader is a pitiful
example of the fallacy of crime.
He is near death from consump-
tion and has not saved the
money for hospital bills. He is
70 years old. Consequently there
were contributions offered by
residents of the city to pay for
medical treatment.

Dresser, at present a trust of-
ficer of the Bank of Italy, was a

Calif., when he was held up by
the Dalton gang in 1891.
