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C. VAN DEUSEN WINS DERBY

Son of Man O'War Leads
Fleet Field in Big
Kentucky Race

CHURCHILL, DOWNS, Louis-
ville, Ky., May 18. (UP)—With
the bit in his teeth and the fire
of his great old daddy in his
eyes, little Clyde Van Deusen,
son of Man O'War, lashed his
way courageously through a
sea of mud into a driving rain to
spread-eagle the Kentucky Derby
field today and add his name to
the roll of honor of winners of
the greatest of American turf
classics.

Herbert Gardner's plucky
chestnut, brilliantly ridden by
Pony McAttee, dashed across the
barrier while some \$9,000,
drenched with one of the worst
downpours in Kentucky Derby
history, cheered his smashing
success. Out of the west came
the Wiltshire stable's Nabsayer,
another game horse no matter
what the weather, to fight his
way into second place two lengths
behind the winner. Panchito,
from the Three D's stock farm,
was third, three lengths back.

It was a day to try the heart
of the bravest of thoroughbreds,
and Man O'War's baby had just
what was needed. There was a
hint of his mighty sire in the
way the little chestnut stepped
out in front and withstood all
challenges.

Lightning flashed and thunder
roared and a driving rain whip-
ped the quagmire of track to
ribbons, but Clyde Van Deusen,
with the rush of the old man
himself, knew nothing but to race
until the winning post was
passed. The time was 2:04.5,
through lakes and rivulets.

Blas Larkspur, pride of Ken-
tucky, failed his backers and sent
their pride drooping like the
finery of the vast throng which
was soaked through by the
storm. Yet the Bradley colt had
courage of his own to display in
the final charge for the wire and
he was up to snuff fourth place.

WALES, HAGEN WIN MATCH

LONDON, May 18. (UP)—The
Prince of Wales and Walter
Hagen met today on the Swinley
Forest golf course, teamed to-
gether, and before a small gal-
lery defeated Sir Philip Sassoon
and Aubrey Boomer, one up in
an 18-hole match.

It was not the first meeting of
the popular heir to the British
throne and the popular holder of
the British open golf title, but it
was the first time they had met
as fellow golfers to try their
clubs in a friendly match.

Complete secrecy enveloped
preparations for the match and
so successful were the arrange-
ments made that only a few per-
sons knew the whereabouts of
the pair, or the result of the
match until it was ended.

Boomer, one of England's lead-
ing professionals, and Hagen,
king of the American moneyed
players, eluded a great group of
newspapermen upon leaving their
hotel here early today and went
directly to the York house, the
prince's residence, in a motor
car he sent for them. There they
joined the prince and Sir Philip,
leaving at once for Swinley For-
est.

Nothing definite was learned
from any of them until later in
the day, when Hagen returned
to his hotel and told reporters of
the match.

"The prince is a serious golfer
and student of the game," Hagen
told the United Press. "He stud-
ied every shot and played care-
fully."
"I said nothing for the first
few shots, but realizing his seri-
ousness, coached him on later
holes, criticizing each shot and
trying to help him analyze his
game. He responded expertly,"
Hagen said.

LOS ANGELES, May 18 (UP)—
Johnny Doe, tennis star of
Stanford University, continued
his excellent form in the finals
of the Pacific coast intercolle-
giate tennis tournament on the
Los Angeles tennis club courts
here today and won the cham-

Doe was hard pressed by the
northerner at times, but his

Harrison's defense.

pionship in this class by downing
Doe and Wheatley by 6-2, 6-2.
