

MORGAN HOLDS JUNIOR CROWN

Lightweight Champ Outpoints Baby Sal Sorio, Takes Eight Rounds

WRIGLEY FIELD, Los Angeles, May 20. (UP)—Tod Morgan retained his junior lightweight title here tonight when he easily outpointed Baby Sal Sorio, the San Bernardino Mexican, in a 10-round outdoor bout.

Morgan had the better of it from the start, clearly outboxing his opponent. Morgan used his left to decided advantage, while Baby Sal failed in numerous attempts to smash through his dangerous right.

Sal came out swinging with two hands in the sixth and continued his desperate tactics in the tenth, but futilely.

Morgan fought the last five rounds with his left hand, apparently having hurt his right near the end of the fifth. Even when he was using his right sparingly he was never in danger.

Morgan took eight rounds. The eighth was even and the third went to Sorio.

Sorio's vaunted right failed to land solidly on Morgan once during the fight, although a slight clip on the chin, followed by a left in the region of the groin, dropped Morgan in the third round. A look of pain covered Morgan's face, but he did not make a protest of foul. Both were well under the weight limit of 120 pounds.

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Fir Mills Cut Lumber Output

velops that most of the mills have fairly satisfactory order files, and with a complete shutdown to be taken within the next two weeks the average operation will go into June with considerable business on its books on which shipment is past due. Such a situation is liable to make buying difficult right from the jump; in fact, there is evidence of it already, as mills that were showing some anxiety to make sales the early part of last week are refusing to quote on anything calling for quick shipment, as they will be unable to get out many of the orders already sold on the time promised.

Inquiry Reported Stimulated The psychological effect of this abrupt reduction in the cut has stimulated inquiry and there has been a noticeable increase in telegraphic orders from districts that had unquestionably been holding back their placements in the hopes of securing lower prices.

It is known that with the possible exception of the Atlantic coast, which has been stagnating under a continuous stream of transits, the other major markets have only limited stocks and are in a position to buy in good volume if convinced that it is a safe time to do so. That is especially true of California cargo business. The stocks of unsold lumber on the docks in California have been at the lowest point for several weeks that they have reached in years, and the retail dealers as a rule have a smaller footage than usual in their yards. That inclination has been encouraged by the trend of the market the first part of the month, as for a time it did look as though prices would soon be injured if production was allowed to keep up to the high level it had reached. If the California retailers become sold on the idea that the mills mean business, they are liable to do as they did in May last year and buy in a volume which will quickly clean up all stock accumulation.

Rail business has never been much, if any, out of balance, and it is predicted that there will be a shortage of the most-called-for items of yard stock by the end of the month. The car material market will also be given a new lease on life, which is remarkable, as this demand has held up far beyond where it usually does.

While the first benefits of production regulation will be very helpful, coming at this time, it promises to put a foundation under the relation of the supply
