der, their figures on the project were \$11,615.35, Dunn and Baker of this city were the other bidders on the project. Their bid was \$11,759.35.

To Pass Adams
It was learned at the meeting last night that Adams street an important outlet from Mills Addition and East Main to Sixth street had not been included in the Mills Addition improvement project now before the council. Property holders along this street declare it must be included in the project which takes up the macadamizing of over 90 blocks in Mill's and Darrow additions. It was not believed by the council that work would commence on this unit before next spring. Date for hearing of objections on the unit has been set for the early part of June.

The city attorney was instructed to draw up an ordinance limiting the parking time on Klamath avenue from Fifth to Eleventh streets to one hour. The limit heretofore has been four hours, but this was believed to be too long for this busy section of the street.

Zoning Held Up
Since there were no objections on improvement unit number 2, the city attorney was authorized to draw up an ordinance authorizing the improvement. It was disclosed at the meeting that the zoning ordinance is ready to be submitted to the city attorney for approval. Before the ordinance is passed the people living in the various districts will have a chance to agree on boundaries as specified in the ordinance.

The police committee recommended the following rooming house permits: Grace I. Barlow, 508 Plum street; Mrs. W. Crandall, 631 Main; H. M. Hagby, 421 Market; and Gertrude Teague Polican Theater building.

Eleven building permits aggregating \$24,965 were approved.

O. C. & E. Offers To Buy City Bonds

of lot 8 except the northeasterly 14 feet thereof, of block 95; all of lots 9, 9 and 10 of block 105; and a rectangular tract as follows: beginning at the southwest corner of lot 5 1/2 of block 95, thence southeasterly 79 feet along the easterly line of Seventh street to the intersection of the northerly line of Plum street, thence northeasterly 26 feet along said northerly line of Plum street to the southeasterly corner of lot 6 of block 95; northeasterly along the westerly line of said lot 6 to the easterly corner of said lot 5 1/2; thence to the point of beginning. Also a triangular tract of land beginning at the intersection of the westerly line of Commercial street, Second Railroad addition, and southeasterly line of Elm street, thence southeasterly along the southeasterly line of Elm street 160 feet; thence southeasterly parallel to and 100 feet distant at right angles to the northeasterly line of Sixth street to the intersection of the west line of Commercial street to the point of beginning.

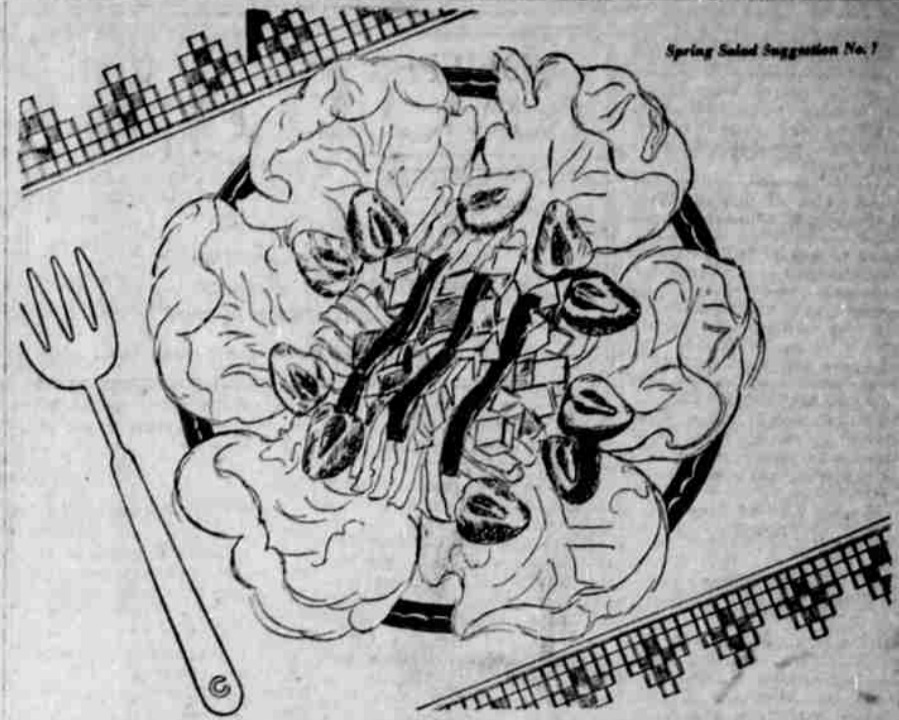
