June 3rd, 1929, for the improvement of School street from 5th street to 6th street and Lincoln street from 6th street to 8th street, said project to be known as Improvement Unit No. 72.

Proposals must be submitted on the blank forms attached to the specifications and enclosed in a plain sealed wrapper, bearing the superscription "Proposal to Construct City Improvement." Each proposal must be accompanied by a bidder's bond or certified check on some reliable bank for five per cent of the aggregate bid.

Following are the principal items involved: Excavation 2900 cu. yds.; cement concrete pavement or asphaltic concrete pavement, 2074 sq. ft.; pipe sewers 765 lin. ft.; together with appurtenant items and materials. The work must be completed on or before September 15, 1929. Plans and specifications may be inspected at the office of Police Judge or may be obtained by filing tendering bid upon deposit of fifteen dollars, which amount will be refunded upon return of said plans in good condition, if accompanied by a proposal.
