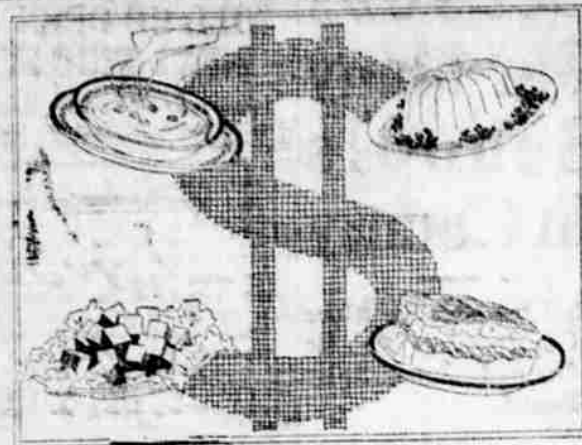

A Dollar Dinner For Four

*Cream of Asparagus Soup
 Rice and Salmon Mold with Cream Sauce
 Jellied Sauerkraut Salad with Mayonnaise
 Peach Shortcake
 Coffee*

FOUR advantages for both the elaborate and expensive dinner and for the least costly meal. It has stimulating properties which prepare the stomach for what is to follow. It satisfies the most pressing pang of hunger without overloading the stomach and so prevents overeating of rich and expensive food, or, in the case of a limited food budget, of the meat or main dish. Hence, smaller servings satisfy the appetite.

In the menu above we suggest a cream soup because it is filling though not considered strictly a dinner soup. A can of soup costs ten cents and will serve four people. A can of pink salmon costs 17 cents, one-half pound of rice 3 cents, one-half can of sauerkraut 7½ cents; gelatine, one

tablespoon 5 cents, mayonnaise 4 cents, lettuce 5 cents, small can of sliced peaches 15 cents, flour 3 cents, coffee 4 cents, one large can of evaporated milk 11 cents, and one-quarter pound of butter 13 cents. This totals 97 cents leaving 3 cents for salt, vinegar for the salad and other ingredients such as baking powder. The large size can of evaporated milk is sufficient for the cream sauce, the shortcake and even for whipping to serve with the shortcake.

Rice and Salmon Mold: Boil one-half pound of rice and drain. Combine with one can of salmon, flaked and free from skin and bones. Combine with a thick cream sauce and steam for one hour. Unmold, pour remaining cream sauce over and garnish with parsley.

Cook House Important

The club is now raising funds to pay for the new phonograph in the school building, as the camp has a teacher and education institution all its own. The trustees are Carl Lang, C. E. Everett and Mrs. J. J. Villair.

The next place of importance is the cook house. This important center, where the men rather than the women, is presided over by Chief L. Dence and his merry crew of fast working clerks, among whom are E. C. Berry, G. E. Olsen, William Zorge, Clem Newby and George Andrews.

Have Machine Shop

A private camp store is maintained, with Mrs. Villair, assisted by Miss Alice Westing, in active charge of the merchandising.

For the quick repairing of broken equipment a fully equipped machine and blacksmith shop is maintained under the direction of J. E. Linder, whose assistant is W. D. Robbitt. B. G. Coulter keeps saws sharp for the loggers.

The tractor and big wheel system is used by the Ewauna company for getting the logs out to the railroad ready for transportation to the sawmill plant in Klamath Falls.

U. S. Is Building

The government maintains a scaling department right at the camp. In charge of the scaling work is E. W. Neave and his lieutenants are F. J. Duffy and H. Francis. Mr. Neave stated that 50,000,000 feet of pine was measured last season, but in 1929 the sales will fall a little short of that total.

The forest service is erecting a new office and cabin for the scalers and the construction work is in charge of S. O. Davis and John Wagenman of Eugene.
