French Team Defaults to Helen Willis After Being Tardy

AUTEUIL, France, May 21. (U.P.)—The defeat of "Big Bill" Tilden and Mrs. May Sutton Bundy, the insistence of Helen Willis that her opponents default a match for being late, and the appearance of a new and brilliant women's doubles combination featured the day at Auteuil, where the French hard courts championships are in progress.

Mademoiselle Barbier, a young French star, partnered with M. Grand Guillet, played brilliantly in defeating Tilden and Mrs. Bundy, 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. It was an exciting match, with the French team's sound game overcoming the wizardry of "Big Bill."

Miss Willis and her partner, Miss Edith Cross, were on the courts and ready for their match with Misses Danet and Speranza of France when the latter sent word that they could not reach the stadium before 5 p. m., two hours late. The officials rescheduled the match for that hour, but Miss Willis insisted that she and Miss Cross be awarded the match by default, which was done.

A new combination which looks likely to enter the finals of the women's doubles and challenge the assumed supremacy of Miss Willis and her partner appeared unexpectedly at Auteuil today. Rollin Conquer, who was to have partnered with Miss Bowman, the Dutch star, was summoned suddenly to Amsterdam. Miss Bowman then teamed up with Lili Alvarez, the Spanish beauty, making one of the strongest combinations in the championships.

Cinch Second Place; Eight Games Behind Mission Club in First

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21. (UP)—The Los Angeles Angels were more securely entrenched in second place in the Pacific coast league but were still eight games behind the San Francisco Mission after contests of the circuit were ended today.

The Mission administered a sound trouncing to Oakland, a team that had been only one game behind the Angels in the standings. Eight runs in the second inning gave the Mission a lead that was abundant, but they added to it to make the final score 17 to 6 in their favor.

Meanwhile the Los Angeles club, after a slow start, was rolling up scores in the latter frames to beat Portland, 9 to 5.

Hollywood's Stars continued their improved playing to down Sacramento, 11 to 5. They broke a five to five tie with one run in the seventh and made five in the eighth.

The San Francisco Seals, in a tie with Oakland for third place, also dropped two full games behind the Angels by losing to Seattle, 6 to 5, in a contest that they never led but often provided a serious threat.
