SMITH SETS NEW RECORD

Young Pro Celebrates 21st Birthday By Scoring 273 on Course

ST. CLOUD, France, May 22. (EP)—As if fearful his 21st birthday might pass unnoticed, Horton Smith, youngest of America's leading professionals, today won the professional golf championship with an aggregate score of 273 for his four rounds over the St. Cloud Country Club course. Pairing a 79 and 71 with two 66's of Tuesday, Smith finished five strokes ahead of a great field.

Feat Remarkable
His feat was the more remarkable in face of the great 61 scored by Aubrey Boomer in the third round—the greatest competitive score ever recorded, and 16 strokes under par for the course. Boomer is the British professional.

Going out on his morning round, Boomer scored a 23 and on the homeward nine required but 28—nine under par. It was such an amazing exhibition that Smith's great feat in winning the tournament was nearly forgotten.

Americans Show
Boomer shot a 71 in the afternoon to finish with a total of 278, seven strokes ahead of Gene Sarazen, former American open champion, who totaled 285. Johnny Farrell, holder of the American open title, was third with 290 and Andre Boyer, France, was fourth with 292. Hazen shot a 293 to shift fifth place with Tom Cotton, British pro.

Doings of the American Legion In Klamath Falls

At a meeting of the Klamath Falls post of the American Legion held last Tuesday evening, plans were formulated for the Memorial Day parade in which the Legion members will take part. The parade leaves the Link River bridge at 10 o'clock and proceeds up Main street to the central school yards, where a program will be held.

The hour between 8 and 9 a. m. has been set for decorating all soldiers' graves in Linkville cemetery. All the organizations of the city are urged to attend the ceremony. The American Legion annually marks all graves of soldiers. This year a number of additional graves will be marked.

It was announced at the meeting that the Baker post of the Legion is putting forth every effort to have the 1929 state convention held at Baker, and has asked all posts of the state to cooperate with this plan.

The citizens' military training camps will soon open in various cities of the Pacific coast. All available men between the ages of 17 and 28 desiring information on the camp may get it from Alfred Collier, commander of the Klamath post.

All honorary discharge certificates may be recorded at the county court house free of charge.
