NEGRO RUNS 100 IN 9.5

220 Dash and 220 Low Hurdle Record Met in Track Meet

EVANSTON, Ill., May 25. (U.P.)—A wiry little Michigan negro and two Ohioans, one a sprinter and the other a hurdler, take rank with the greatest of track men as a result of performances today in the 29th annual Big Ten track and field championships, which the University of Illinois won with 51 1/2 points. Ohio was second with 39 1/2 points and Michigan third with 35.

Eddie Tolan, the second of his race to distinguish himself in the colors of the Maize and Blue (the other was the great Dehart Hubbard), went into the elite circle of 100-yard dash stars when he won his race in 9.5 seconds.

There was a slight wind at his back, but the scientific instruments on the field registered the breeze at only four miles an hour, and Knute Rockne, the Notre Dame Coach, said he believed the recognition committee would allow a record where a wind was no more than five miles an hour. That Tolan's record was no freak was indicated by his performance in his preliminary heat, when he exhibited a mark of 9.6 seconds on an all-most still day. That mark, the present recognized world record. However, Charley Padock and one or two others have done 9.5 and there still is a chance that their marks will be allowed.

George Simpson, Michigan's great sprinter, outran by Tolan in the hundred, came back in the 220-yard dash to equal the world mark in 20.6 seconds, and Richard Hockaway, Simpson's teammate, bettered the world mark in the 220-yard low hurdles when he stepped the distance in 22.8 seconds, two-tenths of a second better than the record made by Brookings, Iowa, in 1924.

Skepticism Meets Announcement of Big Bill Tilden

AUTREUIL, France, May 25. (U.P.)—"I feel I should retire before I get too far back," William T. Tilden, II., ranking singles star and six times national champion of the United States, told the United Press today.

"This will be my last swing around Europe in the championships, although I shall probably always play tennis for pleasure," Tilden is at present competing in the French hard courts championships here.

"There's a limit in all athletics," he said, "and when one reaches it, one should recognize it."

NEW YORK, May 25. (U.P.)—Polite skepticism on the part of the tennis world greets Bill Tilden's announcement of his impending retirement from world tennis.

Officials of the United States Lawn Tennis association—at whom Big Bill took a sly dig or two in his apology and farewell—were inclined to believe that the Philadelphian was talking through his hat.

"I'd like to bet you two to one that he doesn't go through with it," offered a former president of the association.

Outwardly, of course, there was nothing but polite regret at the announcement by Tilden, ranking singles star of the United States since 1929, that he would play no more international tennis. Big Bill said he would continue to play as an individual, but would not represent the United States as a member of any team after 1929.

Few believe Tilden is serious, beyond his desire to create a mild sensation and sell a magazine story (the original announcement appearing in "Liberty" for June 1). He has cried "wolf" before.
