

PLAN BOXING FOR CONCLAVE

Card During Elks Meet To Be Best Ever Put on Here

A fight card whose main event will be a championship caliber will be one of the features of the annual convention of the Elks lodge in Klamath Falls, July 17, 18, 19 and 20. Already plans are going forward on the match.

A request has been issued by the Elks committee in charge to ask fight fans who have ideas on what would be a good main event or semi-windup, to write to the sporting editor of the Klamath News. From these letters the committee hopes to get a cross section of opinion on the question of what boys would be the best match.

The fight card will be held in the new Pelican theatre building and close to 2,000 will be seated—that includes 400 ringside seats on the stage. It is believed that a \$5,000 house will be raised, enough to guarantee main event and semi-windup of first rate fighters. The main event alone would cost over \$2,000.

Among the various matches being considered is one between "Wildcat" Carter, sensational Negro flash and Baby Sal who recently fought a title match with Ted Morgan, junior lightweight champion. Although Sal scored Morgan once and almost upset him a second time, he lost on points. Carter has fought Morgan and secured a draw. A good semi-windup fighter for this super-card would be Walter Clegg, famous Bakimo Indian and a regular main event shot who has fought two fast main events in Klamath Falls.

"We're going to put on a show here that will eclipse anything ever seen in Klamath Falls before," said Joe "Ter" Bickstaff, who will take a leading part in arranging the fight. "Believe it or not, we're going to run a special fight train from Portland to attend this fight."

Gavuzzi Cuts 34 Minutes Off Lead

EL PASO, Tex., May 27. (UP)—Pete Gavuzzi, bewhiskered Italian, cut 34 minutes from the lead in Johnny Selo, Pansino, N. J., goldsmith, today in the fifty-eighth lap of C. G. Fry's bunions derby. Gavuzzi finished in the 30 mile grid from Fabens to El Paso, making the distance in 3:22:40.

Selo ran fifth today, and his lead margin was reduced to 42 minutes and 30 seconds.

Herbert Hedeman, of New York, oldest man in the race, tied with Sam Richman, of New York, for second today. Gusto Umek, of Italy, was fourth in 3:58:00.

Tuesday the bunioneers move from Texas after a 15-day stay, heading for Las Cruces, New Mexico, 50 miles distant.

Young Golfers Lead in South

DEL MONTE, Calif., May 27. (UP)—Scores of 170 or less will probably qualify golfers for the match play in the 18th annual California Amateur championship. It was apparent tonight when the first 18 holes of the 36-hole qualifying round was completed here.

Two youthful players, Dan Sangster of Los Angeles and Ralph Hoffman of San Jose, led the field of 80 starters when all were in late today, each having a 75. Three cards of 86 were at the bottom of the list of the best 32 today and John J. McHugh of San Francisco, defending champion, was tied for tenth place.

SPORTSMATTER

NEW YORK, May 27. (UP)—Jack Dempsey confessed today that his attempt to break into New York as a fight promoter had proved a failure, and announced that he will turn his attention to staging bouts in Chicago next fall.

At the same time, the former heavyweight champion severed his connection with the rather nebulous firm of Cole and Fugazy, and signed up as matchmaker at the Coliseum in Chicago.

Ed (King) Cole, the windy little impresario, and Humbert Fugazy were closeted tonight to see if there was a possibility of restraining Jack by legal means from cancelling his contract to act as their matchmaker.

"Cole and Fugazy promised to have the site for an outdoor arena purchased by May 25," the ex-champion explained. "This was to be in the borough of Manhattan or within walking distance of the Brooklyn end of the East river bridge."

Leaving New York "They also gave me to understand that they could get the Polo Grounds."

"Two months have passed since I signed up with them, and they have done nothing. You cannot promote fights without an arena. After investigation I find that all available sites are taken. So I'm leaving New York."

It was the stronghold of boxing in New York established by Tex Rickard and maintained by W. F. Carey and Madison Square Garden, which really forced Dempsey's withdrawal from New York.

Will Not Fight As his own boss, however, he may promote bouts in other cities than Chicago. The first big bout which he has in mind is slated for Montreal July 4, with George Godfrey, the big negro heavyweight as one of the principals.

The suggestion was made in fight circles today that Dempsey's break with Cole and Fugazy might mean that he intended to start training for a fight in the fall.

Nothing is farther from the ex-champion's thoughts at the moment. The United Press learns from Dempsey that he has no intention of ever returning to the ring. He may change his mind, if a large enough purse is put up, but for the moment he maintains that he does not intend to fight again.

Routis Defends Title in Bout

BALTIMORE, Md., May 27. (UP)—Andre Routis of France successfully defended his world featherweight championship here tonight by knocking out Buster Brown of Baltimore in the third round of a scheduled 15-round bout. Brown's seconds threw in the towel after he had been down twice for counts of six and seven.

Expect Pacific Coast Teams to Keep Positions

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27. (UP)—Relative positions of the teams in the first division of the Pacific Coast league are destined to remain about the same this week unless the Portland Beavers unexpectedly capture their series with the San Francisco Seals.

The league-leading San Francisco Missions are expected to win a majority of games they play against the Sacramento Senators, while the Los Angeles Angels, in second place eight games behind the Missions, will oppose the last place Seattle Indians.

The Seals could only win four out of seven games with Seattle last week but stayed in third place, where they are hard pressed by the Hollywood Stars. Winners of six out of seven games against Sacramento last week, the Stars apparently have sufficient strength to outplay the Oakland club this week and if the Beavers could upset the Seals Hollywood might climb into third place.

One change in the preliminary card supporting tomorrow night's main event at the auditorium between Leo Lomski and Yale Okum was made yesterday by Matchmaker Joe Levy. The shift is in the six-round semi-final in which Tiny Hayes of Independence was slated to fight Tony Telareco, Eddi Eicher's new heavyweight prospect.

Hayes notified Levy yesterday he could not fill tomorrow night's date so the Portland matchmaker immediately got busy and signed Earl Ritchie of Klamath Falls to face Telareco. Ritchie has appeared in the Portland ring several times. He is a big, rugged fellow with more than 50 fights under his belt.

Eicher is sweet on Telareco, the rangy Italian truck farmer from Walla Walla, who recently joined his stable. With one attraction like Leo Lomski in his string of battles it doesn't look as if Eicher would have much time to spend on a green prospect, but the Aberdeen manager says he is going to carry Telareco along for a while.
