Hubbert told police he shot
Mrs. Burch when she attempted
to stone him as she stepped out
of the car. He followed the
group, he said, when they had
molested his mother by driving

house.

Hubbert was released on \$1000
bond after charges of assault
with intent to murder had been
filed against him.

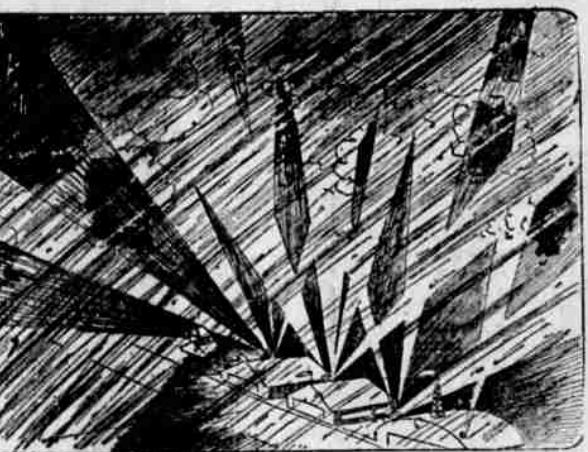
